Sir,

I am pretty sure my Dad, **Jack D. Gettman**, served with the 517th (as a member of the 13th Airborne Division) during WWII. However, he was killed in an accident at work in 1976 at age 53 and I have limited information about him. I do know that he was wounded in France and received a PH for his wound.

Also, I am pretty sure that he was in Belgium (because he complained about his feet which were frozen in the war). My parents were divorced and my Mom has also passed. Any information or direction you could point me in would be of help. Just trying to catch up on my Dad's life.

Yes, indeed. PFC Jack D. Gettman was in Company D of the 517 PIR. At the end of the war, the 517PIR was assigned to the 13th Airborne. But throughout all the fighting the 517 was an independent unit, who fought "where they were most needed".

Hello.

My name is David Arthur Purser. I am the last son of **MSG Arthur Joseph Purser**. He is listed on your website was a recipient of the Silver Star. As you can see on the attached picture of his tombstone located at the Ft. Benning Sand Hill

cemetery, that my father also earned the Distinguished Service Cross which is not noted under DSC recipients on your website.



I've been on a search going on 5 years for information about my father's achievements while serving as a soldier for the Army. Haven't come up with much because i don't know where to look. I found your website searching my father's name in google. I've never read the actual citations of how he earned these medals (don't know where to look) and my father was never known to brag about what he'd achieved. I only heard two war stories involving death while I was growing up no matter how much I asked. He seemed to like telling the funny stories much better. I have a bag of Medals that the Army sent to me when I requested them, however they are incomplete there a couple missing from the list they sent me due to them not being in stock at the time they shipped them to me. My daddy always said he was going to put a dress uniform with all his medals together but he never got to it. He was too busy working for us, his family. I hope to do this for him someday.

I have only a couple pictures of my daddy (when he retired) if anyone is interested. I remember at his funeral back in 98' and old trooper showed up whom I had never met and told me he had some old film of my daddy driving a jeep. What I wouldn't give to see it but sadly I have no idea where to start looking for this gentleman with the footage, or even if he still walks the earth.

Any help would be greatly appreciated or any points in the right direction. I live in Orlando (where he moved us to in 86'), and try to drive to Benning to visit my daddy any Christmas that I can.

Dear Bob,

Late Wednesday afternoon a member of the VA staff told me that a member of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, who is resident here, was to be awarded the Congressional Gold Medal on Thursday morning, and invited me to attend. I told him that we had fought alongside the 442nd in Italy and that some of them--an anti-tank platoon and some four point two mortar crews were brought in by glider and supported our attacks in and around the drop zone in the Southern France invasion. I attended the ceremony and they had me say a few words about this great outfit that is the most highly decorated in the armed services. Most of the 517th troopers will remember their reputation. The awardee had five members of the 442nd accompany him and afterward we had an "old home week". They all remembered the 517th.
