Trooper **John Peters** 517PIR passed away Dec 2010 while living in Florida. His body was cremated and our Chapter Honor Guard, Weakland, Black, Heisler, Brick, Weaver, Anderson, Loftus and Winkler preformed the Airborne Service of Prayer, 21 Gun Salute, presentation of the Flag, and Taps at Weastern Reserve National Cemetery, Rittman, Ohio on Friday 24 June 11. John was a WWII Vet and served in Italy. Few of us knew him because he was ill and lived Florida for several months.

Kennard B. Hays 187RCT served in Korea where he had two combat jumps, received the Bronze Star and Purple Heart. He was recognized as a distinguished member of the 187 at Fort Campbell in 2001. He was a member of the 187 Combat Team, the 187 Parachute Regiment, the 11 Abn Div Assoc and the 82nd Abn Div Assoc, Akron Chapter. Kennard was a quiet but highly respected and friendly person. We will miss him.

Martha Raye,

Most of the old time entertainers were made out of a lot sterner stuff than today's crop of activists and whiners. The following is from an old Army Aviator who takes trip down memory lane:

It was just before Thanksgiving '67 and we were ferrying dead and wounded from a large GRF west of Pleiku ,Vietnam. We had run out of body bags by noon, so the Hook (CH-47 CHINOOK) was pretty rough in the back. All of a sudden, we heard a 'take-charge' woman's voice in the rear.

There was the singer and actress, Martha Raye, with a Special Forces beret and jungle fatigues, with subdued markings, helping the wounded into the Chinook, and carrying the dead aboard. 'Maggie' had been visiting her Special Forces 'heroes'.

We took off, short of fuel, and headed to the USAF hospital pad at Pleiku. As we all started unloading our sad pax's, a 'Smart-Ass' USAF Captain said to Martha.... Ms. Ray, with all these dead and wounded to process, there won't be time for your show!

To all of our surprise, she pulled on her right collar and said.....Captain, see this eagle? I am a full 'Bird' Colonel in the US Army Reserve and on this is a 'Caduceus' which means I am a Nurse, with a surgical specialty. Now take me to your wounded.

He said, yes ma'am.... Follow me.

Several times at the Army Field Hospital in Pleiku, she would cover a surgical shift, giving a nurse a well-deserved break.

Martha is the only woman buried in the Special Forces cemetery at Ft. Bragg, NC.
