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The 2011 Re-invasion of Southern France

Hey, Merle and Bob -

So I don't think we told you about our trip to Col de Braus this past August.

Leo Dean, Allan Johnson and I went with good friends **Roland Orengo** and **Gilles Guinard** on the quest into the hills above Sospel right around Hill 1098. Although the little restaurant at CoI de Braus was closed that day, they opened especially for us at Patricia Orengo's request. The owners will do anything for the men of the 517; the restaurant is decked with tributes and history, and many photos. They received a Certificate of Appreciation from the 517 in 2009, and it hangs proudly.

So we arrived at the appointed time, and were warmly greeted by the restaurant owners. Elizabeth, seeing us, immediately exclaimed, "Is Merle here?" Oh, she was so sad that he wasn't along with us this year and sends kisses to Merle. She is so adorable I really think he should go get them himself. The lunch was fabulous!

During October, the last towns of France were liberated in the Col de Bras - Sospel area. Roland pointed out the devastation that is still visible, both in the hillsides and in the buildings in the town. Something like 80,000 rounds were fired in the area; if I am remembering correctly, about 40 French soldiers and about 40 French civilians were killed. Paratrooper's Odyssey tells us that in the 517-460-596, 123 men were wounded, 21 were killed and 3 captured during the week of fighting at Col de Braus.

The people of France have not forgotten that you came to help when they needed you, and we know they think of you in October.

Since we are on the subject of Capt. Bill Young, I will add a few. He was in charge of the 517th MP detachment in Lille, France just after one of our secret missions was called off. I was his deputy. **Col. Graves** had us as MPs as the battle hardened troopers would not follow orders of MPs without boots. The first day I reported to Young; he told me to take charge and I never saw him again. That suited me fine as I had a great bunch of 517th troopers and we kept everyone out of my jail except **McQuade** who we incarcerated before he tore the town apart and shot some civilian. Lille is where we were when the War in Europe ended. The trucks and troopers arrived at noon and departed at midnight. VE Day is one I will always remember. The French went wild and played their national anthem day and night for three days.

Right after the jump **Bill Young** gave some first Bn. men an order to cross a bridge the Jerries had zeroed in with all types of artillery and small arms fire. It would have been suicide. **Bill Boyle** came along in time to countermand the order and put the troopers into an action which saved most of their lives and saved the day in Le Muy.

I will end with the only thing I know about Bill Young that has a good ending. At Bergstein, Germany we captured only one German paratrooper. The others died fighting to the last man. We only captured him because we knocked him out with a concussion grenade. He was a huge man, but we carried him to regimental headquarters and turned him over to Bill Young. When the Kraut came to he was ready to fight and took a swing at Bill who clobbered him.

There must be a lot of untold stories that will never be recorded.



Sgt. Norman S. Frey, H Company

Bob,

Hi my name is Stephen McNamara and I am looking for information on my grandfather **Norman Samuel Frey**. He served in the 517th company H and he received 2 silver stars while in combat but I have been unable to confirm one of the awards. I have the original letter from one of the silver stars that was given at the time of the award and signed by E.G. Chapman (Eldridge G. Chapman) but the other silver star has no letter with it. Also I was curious if any of the men that served in the 517th were still alive? And if so would it be possible to communicate with any?

Thanks for your help, I tried the official Army records and they think it may have burned in the fire of 1973 ⊗

I will post your email on the next MailCall, a weekly email newsletter that I send out to 517th troopers, friends and family. Not all troopers are "on the net", but the email still goes out to about 370 people.

I see that your grandfather was in H Company. http://517prct.org/documents/xmas1944/xmas1944.htm

My Dad, Ben Barrett was a Corporal in H Company and most likely knew him. Unfortunately, Ben died last year, but there are a few H Company and 3rd Battalion men still around. I will let you know if I get any responses.

Also, we are in the process of documenting and digitizing the "Morning Reports" that are available. I have a copy of the H Company morning reports, and below [next page] is what I found on your Grandfather. I don't know what all the shorthand codes mean, but it look like he was injured at least once and was listed as MIA from Dec 27 1944 (the attack on Manhay) up until early January. You should read up about the attack on Manhay, if you haven't already. I have some oral history about that on the web site at http://517prct.org/documents.htm

Does the Silver Star citation say any more about the location, or other people? Can I get a copy? Chapman was the commander of the 13th Airborne, so the award was done after the 517th was reassigned into the 13th. From what I hear, it became difficult for 517th troopers to get documented and approved for any decorations after the 13th AB came in.

Here is what I found....The first photo is of my grandfather and I have this framed with the Silver Star and the Purple Heart. The next photo is a photo of the actual citation from E.G. Chapman that was folded and in the box with the medal from the day he got it to when I opened it in January 1994 right before he passed away from lung cancer. The last photo is a series of photo's together that my cousin was nice enough to send me, it should be noted that my grandfather was in the military twice, once in the late thirties and then he volunteered again in 1944 (ish) I believe this picture of him and another gentleman may have been from his first time in the military but I am not sure. I would be interested in obtaining any information related to the photos or anything else you may dig up. Many thanks for your help, I appreciate it very much.


