HONOLULU — For more than half a century, members of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association gathered here every Dec. 7 to commemorate the attack by the Japanese that drew the United States into World War II. Others stayed closer to home for more intimate regional chapter ceremonies, sharing memories of a day they still remember in searing detail.

But no more. The 70th anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack will be the last one marked by the survivors' association. With a concession to the reality of time — of age, of deteriorating health and death — the association will disband on Dec. 31. (Read the full story here)

Anyway, he was right in the middle of his physical therapy and sound very good on the phone. He told me he had just made a sky dive jump about a week before his accident in Florida and had been scheduled to do another one, but because of his fall had to cancel it. He told me with all the jumps he has made he has never gotten hurt and now this. Anyway, he sounds like he is on the road to recovery and is making plans to attend the mini reunion in Kissimmee. It was so good to talk with him and know he is okay. Speedy recovery Leo, you are truly one rough tough airborne trooper!

On another note, someone commented on my posting of the soldiers from the old guard who walk the tomb of the unknown soldier. They asked me if I knew if the soldiers carried live ammunition while walking their tours. To my knowledge they do not, but as you and I know orders can change at any time. The rifles they carry are M-14's that weight 9.1 lbs. I know because I carried one in the Marine Corps. This weapon requires a magazine to load the ammunition. Subject: Christmas

- 1. An official visit by General Santa (NMI) Claus is expected at this headquarters 25 December 2011. The following instructions will be in effect and govern the activities of all personnel during the visit.
- a. Not a creature will stir without official permission. This will include indigenous mice. Special stirring permits for necessary administrative actions will be obtained through normal channels. Mice stirring permits will be obtained through the Office of the Surgeon General, Veterinary Services.
- b. Personnel will settle their brains for a long winter nap prior to 2200 hours, 24 December 2011. Uniform for the nap will be: Pajamas, cotton, light, drowsing, with kerchief, general purpose, camouflage; and Cap, camouflage w/ear flaps. Equipment will be drawn from CIF prior to 1900 hours, 24 December 2011.
- c. Personnel will utilize standard field ration sugar plums for visions to dance through their heads. Artificially sweetened plums are authorized for those in their unit weight control program. Specifications for this item will be provided by the servicing dining facility.
- d. Stockings, wool, cushion sole, will be hung by the chimney with care. Necessary safety precautions will be taken to avoid fire hazards caused by carelessly hung stockings. Unit Safety Officers will submit stocking hanging plans to this headquarters prior to 0800 hours, 20 December 2011, ATTN: G4, for approval.
- e. At the first sign of clatter from the lawn, all troops will spring from their beds to evaluate noise and cause. Immediate action will be taken to tear open the shutters and throw open the window sashes. G4 Plan (Saint Nick), Reference LO No. 3, paragraph 6c, this headquarters, 2 February 2009, will be in effect to facilitate



shutter tearing and sash throwing. Division chiefs will familiarize all personnel with procedures and are responsible for ensuring that no shutters are torn open or window sashes thrown open prior to start of official clatter.

- f. Prior to 2400 hrs, 24 December 2011, all personnel will be assigned "Wondering Eye" stations. After shutters are thrown open and sashes are torn, these stations will be manned. Military Police will be on site to provide traffic control if needed.
- g. The G4 will assign one each Sleigh, miniature, M-66, and eight (8) deer, rein, tiny, for use of General Claus' driver who, IAW current directives and other applicable regulations, must have a valid SF 56 properly annotated by Driver Testing; be authorized rooftop parking and be able to shout "On Dasher, on Dancer, on Prancer and Vixen, up Comet, up Cupid, on Donner and Blitzen".
- 2. General Claus will enter quarters through standard chimneys. All units without chimneys will draw Chimney Simulator, M-6, for use during ceremonies. Chimney simulator units will be requested on Engineer Job Order Request Form submitted to the Furniture Warehouse prior to 19 December 2011, and issued on DA Form 3161, Request for Issue or Turn-in.
- 3. Personnel will be rehearsed on shouting "Merry Christmas to all and to all a good night." This shout will be given on termination of General Claus' visit. Uniformity of shouting is the responsibility of division chiefs.
- 4. Scout Platoon will be providing flank security and gate security at all phase lines on General Claus's route. Check points Alpha Tango 12 through Delta Charlie 16 will man radios during the visit. All GPS tracking will be coordinated with the S3 Operations Sergeant.
- 5. Air Defense Section will stand down five minutes prior to General Claus' arrival and will remain in that status until five minutes after the Generals' departure. During the stand down, eight (8) Blackhawk helicopters will provide air security and escort security the General. We have air superiority during this time. All A-10's from the 162nd Fighter Wing will be on full alert during the General's visit. See the chain of command listing for scramble authority.
- 6. All naughty and nice personnel will be under the control of the S-1 and S-2 NCOIC accordingly.
- 7. Medical Section will be fully staffed along with two (2) Evac choppers in the event they are needed.
- 8. After actions reports are to be submitted and on my desk NLT 0900 26 December.

I had discovered his name in the '44 Christmas roster previously but unfortunately little exists in the way of photos, stories, specific battery history, etc. for Battery D. I'd be very interested in where he landed during the southern France invasion and any other battery specific information that could help in locating some of his locations when his daughter and I visit Europe next September.

"Ode to a Top Hand" Sergeant Eddie E. Ellington

He usually responded "guilty". We met for the first time at the Induction Center in Dallas and from there we loaded on buses for a trip to Camp Wolters. Eddie stood out. In preparation for "boot camp" he had his head shaved. Upon arrival everyone got a haircut including bald Eddie. They even deducted two-bits for the haircut from his



first month's pay. He was a long time living that down.

At Camp Wolters we received the Airborne pitch and decided to join. The train trip to Toccoa was a mess, Basic training was worse. Then on to "Jump School" Camp Mackall and overseas.

I saw the medics bring him down a hill in Italy. The back of his field jacket was a bloody mess. We were sure we've seen the last of Eddie. He was back before the dust settled.

In the "Bulge" he asked, "Where is the fire coming from?" "Out of the window above your head", was the response.

Eddie backed up so fast, he said, "I bet the imprint of my butt is still on that brick wall".

After the war was over we went to Fort Sam Houston for discharge. In the pay line a hitch developed. No jump pay! The Pay Master said, "Why not sign and worry about your jump pay later."

We refused and hung around San Antonio for a week or ten days until they worked it out. Not having been paid, money became scarce. Most of us being Airborne, we spent our time at better things such as Church, Teas, Libraries etc.

I wound up in Dallas and had a job waiting in Corsicana. I knew Eddie was in Chatfield and went to visit him. I flagged him down on his mail route and we went over the ten years since we last met.

I did see him at a couple of mini reunions and we also kept in touch by phone.

After I found out he had cancer I wanted to take him on a fishing trip. It was too late.

And to the people who run the outfit up there let me say this; wherever you put him, Eddie will make a good hand. In the parlance of the range country, "He'll do".
