Manhay 1944 Remembered

It was sixty-seven years ago today (27Dec1944), early that morning, that many Troopers of Company "I", 3rd Battalion, gave their full-measure to friendly fire, in the successful taking of Manhay, Belgium. My uncle, **Floyd A. Stott**, was a 1st Lt. leading his men when fate stepped in. Other troopers, including **Ben Barrett**, and our recent loss **Lud Gibbons**, as well as **Robert Vaught** and **Marvin Moles** have been able to give me details of that morning, and the rest of the day, that I never knew from my own family members.



As I sit here typing, I am glancing at the 1994 photo of Floyd's cross in the Henri-Chapelle American Cemetery and Memorial. Standing on either side of the cross are Ben and Lud. I also look to the side and there is the 2009 photo of Ben, Lud and Gene Frice taken around Floyd's cross. Thank you to all 517th Troopers for honoring your Brothers. Not a day passes that I don't think of you.

And let us not forget that today, American troops were victorious at the Siege of Bastogne.

I sent a personal note to Marty Donahoo, but I need to let the 517th Family know how sad I was to learn of Lud's passing. I have so many great memories of this man, especially when he'd comment about Uncle Floyd, "He was a hell-of-a guy!" That was Lud's way of saying he really liked a person. I have so many fine memories of Lud, with his dapper-look, the wide-brimmed hat, and his tall and easy manner of movement. An ever-present smile and cheerful character, unless he was relating an episode from WW II, are all parts I will carry with me throughout life.



(Comité d'accueil des U.S. Airborne – U.S. Airborne Reception Committee – Battle of the Bulge)

Its history.

At the end of the 60-ies, some veterans began to come back to the Ardennes for revisiting the scenes of the terrible 44/45 winter battles. One of the first in our area was Cpt. Charles E. La Chaussée (517^{th}) and he was received by Mr. and Mrs. Georges Caspar of Bergeval.

Then, in 1971, Joseph Winand, Jules Gillard and Leopold Carlier founded CADUSA. From then on, the visiting veterans were received in family homes, were guided to the places they wished to visit, friendships blossomed and correspondence



started between Ardennes and US families.

The 40th anniversary of the Ardennes Battle, 1984 saw the first real wave of veterans and their families. With appropriate ceremony, several monuments were inaugurated.

In September, a monument to the men of the 505th and the 517th was inaugurated on the field near the Church in St.Jacques.

Another one, made by the inhabitants of Logiermé was inaugurated in memory of the 5 soldiers of the 517th, who lost their life there.

During such ceremony days, all veterans with their families were received and lodged in Ardennes family homes, most of them members of CADUSA. Visits multiplied and every time members of CADUSA or friends of the Welcoming Committee were happy hosts.

In 1989, at the initiative of CADUSA, a monument was made in remembrance of the 700 men of the 551st PIR who lost their life in the final combat of January 7, 1945. The inauguration ceremonies were held on August 20 in presence of Col. Jorg's children, of Col. Dillard and many veterans of the 551st. That same year, CADUSA, at the request of 517th, erected a monument in Wanne in thanks to the Ardennes people for their hospitality and gratitude. It was inaugurated on October 7th in the presence of the President of the 517th PIR Association and many Americans.

In 1992, the Welcoming Committee undertook the necessary administrative work, choice of stones, contacts and construction of a monument at the crossroads of Soy-Hotton, following the wishes of combatants of 517th, who had lost so many friends at this particular crossing. A large group of veterans was present at the inauguration on May 2nd and a bus was provided for them to visit the different places that they remembered. That monument was unveiled by Major Fraser and the daughter of Col. Boyle.

For the 50^{ieth} anniversary in 1994, the Committee still wonders how it was possible to receive the 350 person "Static Line" group, lodge them in families and then guide them to the different ceremonies. It is true that neighbouring villages came to our rescue with great sympathy. Obviously, this is always done in the families for free. All through the year we received many visits, often unannounced but always with great warmth. During the ensuing years, many organised veteran group visited, were assisted and were feasted. O.B.Hill (508th), Doug Dillard (551st), Don Lassen (Static Line) came with veterans of all regiments as well as other GI's and their families.

On the 60th anniversary, June 2, 2004, and after many contacts and preparations with Don Lassen, nearly 350 visitors, that is 80 veterans and their families, received a really memorable welcome. The communities of Ferrières, Lierneux, Vielsalm and Manhay each received and feasted more or less 40 persons, while Trois Ponts and Stoumont received 140 Americans for a remembrance day that ended with a joyous and happy banquet.

CADUSA participates in regional patriotic ceremonies, like the yearly first Saturday in January with homage and flowers remembering 505, 517 and 551 P.I.R.. Mass is held in the St. Jacques church in memory of the US soldiers fallen for our freedom.

Saturday January 9, 2010 was special for this 65th anniversary, with mass at 10 am.


And so, as long as US veterans continue coming, although probably in decreasing numbers, the CADUSA will continue its respectful duty of welcome and remembrance.

Elite WWII Paratrooper is VGF Resident by <u>Kathy Johanns</u>



Bob Rust, an 86-year-old resident at <u>The Village at Gleannloch Farms</u> in Spring, Texas, was only 18 when the young World War II soldier joined one of the US Army's most elite fighting units—the <u>517th Regimental Parachute Team</u>. The men of the 517th were some of America's best, called on to fight their way from the south of France through Italy, Belgium, and finally into Hitler's Germany. This unit is officially connected to five campaigns, but one event especially stands out in Bob's memory: an onslaught in the winter of 1944 that became the crucial focus of the war—later known as the <u>Battle of the Bulge</u>.

Ultimately, the 517th was credited with stopping the forward advance of the "bulge" in its tracks, sealing the demise of the Third Reich. Bob's battalion was honored with the French Croix de Guerre, the Belgian Croix de Guerre, and a special Unit Citation, given only by direct authority of the President of the United States.

"They were very brave men, any of whom would have died for each other without hesitation. They moved forward with dedication and unflinching courage. I was very fortunate to serve with them," said Rust.

Wounded twice during the Second World War steel shrapnel from a German artillery shell is still lodged in his back—Bob is now considered

technically disabled. A year ago, he came to live at The Village at Gleannloch Farms and "gets around" without any assistance in the independent living part of the community.

Today, Bob's medals adorn the wall of his apartment: A Bronze Star and Purple Heart with Oak Clusters, among others. He enjoys talking to other veterans at his new home, where he says, "we're all like one big family."



Celebrating Memorial Day is a timely opportunity to remember the sacrifices made by Bob Rust, the men of the 517th, and other veterans who fought for our freedom.
