I want to thank you, **Gilles, Morris, President Johnson**, and other who came to my aide quickly in determining what aircraft markings were on the C-47's the night of the 517th PRCT jump into Southern France. For those who do not know, a movie producer read my book, *Letters Home a Paratrooper's Story* (about my Dad's letters home to his mother during the time he was in the 517th) and wanted to use parts of it for his World War II movie entitled "Saints and Soldiers Airborne Creed" (you can see a movie trailer by going to youtube.com and typing in Saints and Soldiers Airborne Creed.

Anyway, he called me a few weeks back asking if I knew what the aircraft marking were on the c-47 planes. I had no idea what they were, but with the help of the above people we were able to find out. The movie producer wanted to make sure the marking were accurate for the 517th, and I thanked him for his attention to detail. The movie is frictional, but revolves around three 517th paratroopers making the jump into Southern France, and then getting cut off behind German lines. Although I don't know the entire story of the movie, the 3 troopers link up



with the French Resistance and somehow fight their way back to America lines. Even though the story is frictional, I think this is a great tribute to the legacy of the 517th PRCT. Please see 2 photos I have attached, the first is the movie poster that will be placed in theaters. The second is me with the 3 movie stars playing the parts of the 517th troopers. I did get to be an extra in the movie. You will notice I am wearing my Dad's paratrooper wings from 1943 in honor of him. The movie comes out in May, and I hope to be able to show it at the Kansas City Reunion in July.

"54-B" is the same church and building taken from across the river (the bridge is just visible in the lower right corner). The church is Eglise St. Jean. (St. John Church)

It is, indeed, a part of the WWII Memorial, but you have to know where to find it....I have a photo of it someplace, and if I can locate it will forward....it is in the entrance to the underground service area....look for it! KILROY WAS HERE! WHO THE HECK WAS KILROY?

In 1946 the American Transit Association, through its radio program, "Speak to America," sponsored a nationwide contest to find the REAL Kilroy, offering a prize of a real trolley car to the person who could prove himself to be the genuine article. Almost 40 men stepped forward to make that claim, but only James Kilroy from Halifax, Massachusetts, had evidence of his identity. He was a 46-year old shipyard worker during the war who worked as a checker at the Fore River Shipyard in Quincy. His job was to go around and check on the number of rivets completed. Riveters were on piecework and got paid by the rivet. Kilroy would count a block of rivets and put a check mark in semi-waxed lumber chalk, so the rivets wouldn't be counted twice. When Kilroy went off duty, the riveters would erase the mark. Later on, an off-shift inspector would come through and count the rivets a second time, resulting in double pay for the riveters.

One day Kilroy's boss called him into his office. The foreman was upset about all the wages being paid to riveters, and asked him to investigate. It was then he realized what had been going on. The tight spaces he had to crawl in to check the rivets didn't lend themselves to lugging around a paint can and brush, so Kilroy decided to stick with the waxy chalk. He continued to put his checkmark on each job he inspected, but added 'KILROY WAS HERE' in king-sized letters next to the check, and eventually added the sketch of the chap with the long nose peering over the fence and that became part of the Kilroy message. Once he did that, the riveters stopped trying to wipe away his marks.

Ordinarily the rivets and chalk marks would have been covered up with paint. With war on, however, ships were leaving the Quincy Yard so fast that there wasn't time to paint them. As a result, Kilroy's inspection "trademark" was seen by thousands of servicemen who boarded the troopships the yard produced. His message apparently rang a bell with the servicemen, because they picked it up and spread it all over Europe and the South Pacific. Before war's end, "Kilroy" had been here, there, and everywhere on the long hauls to Berlin and Tokyo.

To the troops outbound in those ships, however, he was a complete mystery; all they knew for sure was that some jerk named Kilroy had "been there first." As a joke, U.S. servicemen began placing the graffiti wherever they landed, claiming it was already there when they arrived. Kilroy became the U.S. super-GI who had always "already been" wherever GIs went. It became a challenge to place the logo in the most unlikely places imaginable (it is said to be atop Mt. Everest, the Statue of Liberty, the underside of I Arc De Triomphe, and even scrawled in the dust on the moon).

As the war went on, the legend grew. Underwater demolition teams routinely sneaked ashore on Japanese-held islands in the Pacific to map the terrain for coming invasions by U.S. troops (and thus, presumably, were the first GI's there). On one occasion, however, they reported seeing enemy troops painting over the Kilroy logo!

In 1945, an outhouse was built for the exclusive use of Roosevelt, Stalin, and Churchill at the Potsdam conference. It's first occupant was Stalin, who emerged and asked his aide (in Russian), "Who is Kilroy?"



To help prove his authenticity in 1946, James Kilroy brought along officials from the shipyard and some of the riveters. He won the trolley car, which he gave to his nine children as a Christmas gift and set it up as a playhouse in the Kilroy front yard in Halifax, Massachusetts.

If you check the WWII memorial in Washington DC, you will see Kilroy peeking over a wall.

So, now you know the rest of the story!

Here is a Newsworthy item. My father served with 517th Parachute Infantry Combat Team, Second Battalion, Co"E", 3rd Platoon, 1st Squad from "Italy to the Battle of the Bulge . On Jan 26th, 2012 (A day before my Birthday) I received an Email from a, Jean-Louis Seel, who lives in Belgium saying that in1988 near the town of Manhay, Belgium he found, my what he believed, to be father's Dog Tags. He sent me a photo, which I have attached to this email, of the tags and I confirmed the serial # from my Dads Army records. During the Battle of the Bulge, Company "E" had spent a 3 days in this area late December, 1944, before going into battle again. My Father was wounded outside Trois-Ponts, Belgium a few days later on January 3rd 1945.

They were dug out by a friend in 1987 near the village of Manhay. Over the years, I tried to identify his unit, now it's done thanks to the tribute page that his son Bill put on the web! PFC Morris was a pathfinder in Co. E 517th Parachute Infantry Regiment. He got two Bronze Stars and was wounded in action near Trois-Ponts on Jan. 3, 1945. Mr. Morris passed away in 1975. Both tags will be shipped this week to his son. A Happy end!
