From morning reports, as described by **Nolan Powell, C Company**:

1/14 - 1/20/45 -Logbierme, Belgium. Left Stavelot early on the 14th attacked toward Logbierme, Belgium less than 10 km distance. In a two day battle in Logbierme, "C" Co had 5 paratroopers killed, William S. Spears one of the replacements that joined the outfit with your Uncle (Stephen R. Stepek), two other earlier replacements, and two others who had been with us since the outfits activation in Toccoa, Georgia in March of 1943. Seven paratroopers were wounded, including myself. I was in five Army hospitals from Jan 15 1945 to January 1946. Since I never returned to the outfit, the remainder of the events are from "C Co. Morning Reports. I assume your Uncle was with the 517th from January 8 to March 31, 1945, and maybe he was still with the 517th when the outfit returned to the U.S. in August of 1945.

To further the discussion about **Sgt Silas Brown** and the 3rd Bn, I asked Mr. Brown during one of the reunions, who took over the 81mm platoon after my Dad was hit by German mortar fire South of Stavelot, Belgium on January 13th, 1945. Mr. Brown said that he took over the platoon as a noncom. If I recall correctly, he remained a non-com until Joigny, when a replacement officer was assigned to lead the platoon. Possibly another reason for the hard feelings about the 13th AB Div.

Also, I asked about the role of my Dad's platoon during the Manhay attack by the 3rd Bn. Mr. Brown and Mr. Jim Royer (my Dad's aide) told me that the platoon acted like a rifle platoon and protected the left flank of the attack. This was due to the importance of the mission and needing every single man to retake Manhay, so all reserves were thrown into the fray. Also, the huge TOT bombardment as the attack kicked off, may have made the heavy mortars unnecessary.

Mr. Howard Hensleigh may be able to shed more light on the details of the battle plans for Manhay.



John McCain and the Pledge of Allegiance

I'm sure I have sent this along before, but I'm proud to send it again. It makes me angry to see a sporting event, where extremely high paid athletes stand around, chewing gum, talking to someone and not delivering the proper salute when the National Anthem is played. The same sense of outrage is in me when I see the Flag approaching in a parade, and people sit and watch, drink their beer and act as if nothing important is happening. On more than one occasion, I have let out a yell that would wake the dead "ON YOUR FEET AND SALUTE OUR FLAG, YOU DUMB S**TS!! Believe me, I got their attention and lots of chairs fell over!!

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In light of the recent appeals court ruling in California, with respect to the Pledge of Allegiance, the following recollection from Senator John McCain is very appropriate:

"The Pledge of Allegiance" - by Senator John McCain

As you may know, I spent five and one half years as a prisoner of war during the Vietnam War. In the early years of our imprisonment, the NVA kept us in solitary confinement or two or three to a cell. In 1971 the NVA moved us from these conditions of isolation into large rooms with as many as 30 to 40 men to a room.

This was, as you can imagine, a wonderful change and was a direct result of the efforts of millions of Americans on behalf of a few hundred POWs 10,000 miles from home.

One of the men who moved into my room was a young man named Mike Christian.

Mike came from a small town near Selma, Alabama. He didn't wear a pair of shoes until he was 13 years old. At 17, he enlisted in the US Navy. He later earned a commission by going to Officer Training School. Then he became a Naval Flight Officer and was shot down and captured in 1967. Mike had a keen and deep appreciation of the opportunities this country and our military provide for people who want to work and want to succeed.

As part of the change in treatment, the Vietnamese allowed some prisoners to receive packages from home. In some of these packages were handkerchiefs, scarves and other items of clothing.

Mike got himself a bamboo needle. Over a period of a couple of months, he created an American flag and sewed on the inside of his shirt.

Every afternoon, before we had a bowl of soup, we would hang Mike's shirt on the wall of the cell and say the Pledge of Allegiance.

I know the Pledge of Allegiance may not seem the most important part of our day now, but I can assure you that in that stark cell it was indeed the most important and meaningful event.

One day the Vietnamese searched our cell, as they did periodically, and discovered Mike's shirt with the flag sewn inside, and removed it.

That evening they returned, opened the door of the cell, and for the benefit of all of us, beat Mike Christian



severely for the next couple of hours. Then, they opened the door of the cell and threw him in. We cleaned him up as well as we could.

The cell in which we lived had a concrete slab in the middle on which we slept. Four naked light bulbs hung in each corner of the room.

As I said, we tried to clean up Mike as well as we could. After the excitement died down, I looked in the corner of the room, and sitting there beneath that dim light bulb with a piece of red cloth, another shirt and his bamboo needle, was my friend, Mike Christian. He was sitting there with his eyes almost shut from the beating he had received, making another American flag. He was not making the flag because it made Mike Christian feel better. He was making that flag because he knew how important it was to us to be able to Pledge our allegiance to our flag and country.

So the next time you say the Pledge of Allegiance, you must never forget the sacrifice and courage that thousands of Americans have made to build our nation and promote freedom around the world. You must remember our duty, our honor, and our country.

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Notes: Before turning to a political career which has included representing the state of Arizona for two terms in the House and four terms in the Senate, John McCain was a United States Naval Academy graduate who served as a naval aviator for twenty-two years and spent five and a half years as a prisoner of war after being shot down over Vietnam in 1967. Senator McCain rose to national prominence during his bid for the 2000 Republican presidential nomination, ultimately losing out to

Senator McCain delivered versions of the anecdote quoted above, the tale of Mike Christian, a Navy navigator who had been shot down in Vietnam six months before McCain and who used a bamboo needle and scraps of colored cloth to sew an American flag inside his shirt several times at speeches given along the campaign trail during 1999-2000, often bringing large crowds to a hush with his story of one prisoner's patriotism. McCain also related this tale in the History Channel's "Prisoners of War: Code of Conduct" series.


