Subject: Uniform **Dear Mr Hensleigh**

I saw in the mail call today that you mentioned the uniform you wore in southern France. You had told me before that you had kept your jump jacket, but I didn't know it was the one you wore in southern France. In fact, are you sure the uniform you kept is the one you wore for the jump, as I remember seeing your american flag that was sewn to the shoulder of the jump suites is in your photo album; which gives me the impression you unsewed the patch at the time you threw away your jump suit.

In any case, if by any chance you do have the actual jump suite you wore for the jump into France, I would be very interested if you had the possibility of sending me a photo of it to include in my book.

Please tell me when you will receive my chapter about Montauroux, and if you like it I can send you some of the other chapters about the 517th.

Dear Jean Loup, The fact is that I didn't wear my jump suit on the S. France jump. I wore plain old fatigues and a field jacket. The fatigues were spray painted with camouflage paint as was the field jacket I wore over the fatigue jacket. As I recall, the 596th men whose photo Bob ran in MailCall wore fatigues, not jump suits. The fatigues were made out of tough stuff and before the jump we were all issued brand new clothing, because we did not know how long we would wear it and supply with our dearth of vehicles did all it could to carry ammo, water and rations to us. A field soldier as well as seasoned campers realize that although hot in the daytime it gets cold at night. We had to be outfitted so we could sleep on the ground without getting too cold. So many of us wore a sleeveless undershirt, a "long john" long winter underwear shirt, the fatigue jacket and the field jacket on top. During daytime forced marches and fire fights most of this clothing came off and was tucked into our web belts. It came out as needed during the night.

I had only one jump suit and saved it. It is still in good condition. Our cloth officers' insignia was sowed underneath the collar of the jackets we jumped so it would not be visible to the enemy. My cross rifles (infantry insignia) are still sewed to the underneath side of my field jacket. I did the sewing so it is a lousy job, but after all these years is still there. Since I wore the field jacket after I was promoted in the lowa National Guard, I removed the 2nd Lt. insignia. That field jacket and my jump suit are in my old foot locker in my daughter's (Nancy) attic in Massachusetts so I can't get to it easily. The last I heard the footlocker was locked and Nancy didn't have the key. I told her to take it to a locksmith and he could unlock it easily, but I don't think she has done that. If you made a picture of it, it should be worn by someone to give you a decent picture.

I did unsew the American Flag from the field jacket and pasted it in the scrap book. There are pictures of it in MailCall.

I look forward to receiving your S. France package and will get back to you pronto when I receive it.



Here are a few samples. – Bob B.



Hi, Naome,


