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Ribbon-Cutting at Seitz Elementary School, Ft. Riley KS



I'm forwarding several emails from my cousin John Seitz with pictures from the ribbon cutting ceremony of Seitz Elementary School. The last one I am forwarding has General Donald MacWillie's speech. It was a beautiful day from the 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders who sang and did synchronized movements, to the brass band, the General's mounted patrol, the presence of Governor Brownback, US Senator Moran, the Under-Secretary of Defense, the Superintendent of the School District, the outstanding principal and faculty (all hand-picked, many with a military connection -- former army brat, served in the armed forces, etc). This was the first new school on Ft. Riley in 50 years. The facility is LEED certified and is a magnificent site for learning. Most of the nearly 700 plus kids have one parent deployed and a lot have both deployed, so a safe, healthy, positive school environment is the one critical stabilizing force. Officials join in ribbon-cutting at Seitz Elementary School

FORT RILEY — In front of an audience, Retired Lt. Gen. Richard J. Seitz stood near the entrance of an educational facility which carries his name. While addressing a

While addressing a crowd filled with military, state and local officials Friday, Seitz was conscious of the honor bestowed upon him and thanked everyone involved.

"It's much more than I deserve," Seitz said about having the 15th school in the Geary County School District named after him.

Seitz was the center of attention during the ribbon-cutting, but he directed the attention to another group of people — educators.

"They are the ones who will distinguish this school," Seitz said. "Not me, not the name Seitz, but Principal (Samrie) Devin and her distinguished teachers."

teachers." After the remarks, he asked for a round of applause for all teachers. The audience responded with thunderous claps. The unselfish gesture is

one of the examples of why his name is attached to the school. District officials selected Seitz because of his commitment and support of education in the area. Seitz had a 35-year career as a U.S. Army officer and paratrooper. He commanded the 2nd Battalion, 517th

Devin said the staff is committed to providing a safe, challenging and joy, ful school for military children.

"We want to start a tradition of excellence at Seitz Elementary," Devin said. Ronald Walker, superin-

Ronald Walker, superintendent of USD 475, said a lot of work and time went into establishing the school.

"It was a hard route to get here — we persevered," Walker said.

Within one week of opening, the school was already over capacity.

"Just think, if it's overcrowded now, there is a strong need for another school on post," Walker said. "We're going to fight and we're going to try to make that happen."

He went on to say that a beautiful school like Seitz brings with it a great learn-

Ist Infantry Division and Fort Riley Senior Commander Brig. Gen. Don MacWillie talked about the school and showed admiration for Seitz.

"It's a first-class school, serving world-class students and world-class families — Army families," MacWillie said. "Ladies and gentlemen, we're blessed to have here a rare breed of a man."

MacWillie said Seitz went above and beyond serving his country and the local community.

"What makes you so special, even with all the accolades, you still take time to get into your car, drive down to a school, someplace in (USD) 475, and read to a child," MacWillie said. Undersecretary of the Army Dr. Joseph Westphal thanked Seitz for his service

thanked Seitz for his service and talked about the role of students from military families. He said they make sacrifices and serve when their parents are away.

"The children of our soldiers are really the legacy our Army and our nation will depend on in the future," Westphal said. "The children grow up understanding what it means to serve and be a part of something larger than themselves. They know the meaning of commitment, dedication and sacrifice."

He said the school is critical not only because it addresses overcrowding, but prepares a student for the future. "I take a great pride in the fact that we're here to lift the unnecessary burden of overcrowded schools for them," Westphal said. "Our military children deserve to attend schools that are safe, functional and conducive to learning."

Sen. Jerry Moran said the necessity for the school and others is based upon the success that Kansas had in 2005 with the Defense Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) Commission process

"Now that many of them are back home with their families, it means our school population keeps increasing." Moran said Friday at the ceremony. "Junction City USD 475 has worked hard to put the resources the taxpayers have contributed to new schools in this community, but they were tapped out." Moran said the district worked with members of the congressional delegation to

find sources of funding. "The perseverance in this community resulted in a new program, a new set of dollars for military installations Moran said the district has plans to break ground for new middle and elementary schools.

Moran said he has known Seitz for a long time and can't think of anyone more deserving of the honor of a school being named after a person.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for us to recognize someone who has made a lifetime commitment to serving this country and its citizens," Moran said.

Located in the Camp Forsyth neighborhood of Fort Riley, the building is the Army's first Residential Communities Initiative School. Some of the features include special art and sciences rooms, autism suites and a specially constructed, FEMA-certified gymnasium, which can be used as a tornado sheiter.

Construction of the new elementary school was funded by Congress through a partnership with Unified School District 475 and Picerne Military Housing, the Residential Communities Initiatives partner at Fort Riley.

Pvt. George A. Meyer – HQ/1

From Gary Bedingfield's <u>Baseball's Greatest Sacrifice</u>, a new website dedicated to baseball players who lost their lives in military service:

George A. Meyer was born in Blackduck, Minnesota, and when he was two years old the family moved to Elk River, a village about 30 miles northwest of Minneapolis, where his father opened a shoe and harness repair shop. George Meyer was shorter than his high school teammates, but he was strong and powerful and captained the school football, basketball and baseball teams at Elk River High School. Baseball coach Milt Salk, who was also the shop teacher, had made a warmup bat out of maple, and Meyer was the only one who could use it.

Meyer could always be called upon to make Elk River's ball games exciting, and one game against neighboring Anoka was a prime example. The first time Meyer was up, he hit the ball out of the park in the trees in left field. The second time he hit it out of center field and they found the ball two houses down the street in the gutter. The third time he got on base and stole second and third. He challenged the pitcher by standing between third and home, and then broke for home. The pitcher threw to the catcher, and Meyer bowled him over, but the catcher came up with the ball. Elk River lost the game by one run.

Meyer was all-district in football in 1940, all-conference and team captain in 1941. In baseball, the Elk River High School team won the District 16 championship in 1941, and he captained the team in 1942. Meyer also played shortstop with the Nowthen town team and helped them win amateur league titles in 1940 and 1941. He signed with the St. Paul Saints of the Class AA American Association following high school graduation in 1942. Playing professional baseball, however, was subject to his father's condition that he would continue his studies during the off-season. Meyer was assigned to the Grand Forks Chiefs of the Class C Northern League, where



he played 68 games between the outfield and shortstop, and batted .228 with 22 RBIs. At the close of the season, in line with his father's wishes, he enrolled at Hamline University in St. Paul, and created a lot of interest with his sparkplug style of play as a freshman fullback on the football team.

Meyer's athletic pursuits were put on hold when military service beckoned in March 1943. His family was of German origin and his father wanted him to go into the Merchant Marine as he did not want his son to have to fight in Europe. Nevertheless, George enlisted with the paratroopers and took basic training at Camp Toccoa, Georgia. In May 1944, he was sent overseas and served in Europe with Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion of the 517th Parachute Regimental Combat Team.

When the German Army launched its offensive against American positions in the Ardennes on December 16, 1944, the 517th was in France. A week later it was on its way to Belgium where it was attached to the 82nd Airborne Division. In the bitter cold weather of January 13, 1945, the 517th launched an attack and captured various German strongholds.

During a brief lull in the fighting around Coulee in Belgium on January 15, 1945, Meyer and a number of men took a five-minute break in a barn. It was a rare opportunity to get a reprieve from the cold weather. When it was time to move on, Meyer was the last one to leave, making sure everyone else was out. Moments later the area was hit with mortar fire and Private Meyer was killed.

Meyer was buried at the American Military Cemetery at Henri-Chapelle, Belgium, but in 1947 his body was returned to the United States and rests at St. John's Lutheran Church Cemetery in Twin Lakes, Minnesota. The American Legion post in Elk River was later named Davis-Darrow-Meyer Post 112 in honor of the three soldiers from the village who gave their lives during the war. On Memorial Day, May 30, 1999, the Nowthen ballpark was dedicated in memory of George Meyer and a granite plaque stands at the entrance to the park in his honor. In 2005, Meyer was a charter member of Elk River High School's Sports Hall of Fame.
