

History of NMAM

In 1999 Senator John McCain introduced legislation to designate the month of May and National Military Appreciation Month. Both the Senate and House of Representatives adopted resolutions calling for Americans to recognize and honor U.S. Service Members during NMAM. These proclamations also urge the President to issue a proclamation calling on the people of the United States to observe NMAM.

The 6 National Observances during National Military Appreciation Month:

Loyalty Day

Date: Wednesday, May 1st, 2013

About: Loyalty to the nation. It is a day set aside for the reaffirmation of loyalty to the United States and to reflect on the proud heritage of our American freedom.

Public Service Recognition Week (PSRW)

Date: Sunday, May 5th – Saturday, May 11th, 2013, Celebrated the first full week in May About: A time set aside to honor the men and women who serve our nation as federal, state, county and local government employees and ensure that our government is the best in the world. The 2013 theme is "Why I Serve."

Victory in Europe Day AKA V-E Day or VE Day

Date: Wednesday, May 8th, 2013

About: May 8th, 1945 is the day the Germans throughout Europe unconditionally surrendered to WW II Allies.

Military Spouse Appreciation Day

Date: Saturday, May 11th, 2013, traditionally set for the Friday before Mother's Day.

About: A day to honor military spouses with appropriate ceremonies and activities. Recognizes the important role our military families play in keeping our Armed Forces strong and our country safe.

Armed Forces Day

Date: Saturday, May 18th, 2013, Celebrated the third Saturday in May every year.

About: A single holiday for citizens to come together and thank our military members for their patriotic service in support of our country. I honors everyone serving in the U.S. Military branches; Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines, Navy.

Memorial Day

Date: Monday, May 27th, 2013, A Federal holiday observed on the last Monday in May. About: A remembrance of our veterans. Commemorates the men and women who died while in military service.

Thanks for in the info on Earl. Mr. Boone is a great man and it has been an honor to get to know him. I visited with him for 4 hours yesterday. I actually printed out that Christmas Document for him last week. You could see the wheels turning in his head as he was reading old F Company names.

We also looked at this F Company picture. F Company at Camp Toccoa 1943 He is top row, 17 from the right. His buddy (Sowell, top row, 3 over to his left) lives in Payson, AZ and they see each other once a year. He was quite fond of Captain McKinley and he said the fellow listed as "Juiky" was a tough S.O.B.!

In response to the question how did he pull off getting promoted from private to sergeant...Everybody was dead...

I will look for more for responses and try and get an updated picture of Mr. Boone.

This Week in 517th History

Letter home to parents, May 10, 1943

In the *Book Letters Home: A Paratrooper's Story*, this is what my Dad said about **Lt. McKinley**: **Lory Curtis**, son of **Bud Curtis** HQ, 1st BN

In a letter he wrote to his mother on May 10, 1943, he asked:

Did my Company Commander send you a letter about me being in this outfit? I heard he sends everyone's folks one what did he have to say?

Bud

Bud's Company Commander, then First Lieutenant **John E. McKinley**, from "F" Company did send a letter to his parents telling Bud's parents about the training and how Bud would become one of the world's finest fighting men. Note: This was quite a letter to send to the parents of an eighteen year old boy who was being turned into a man very quickly to fight for America's freedom. **Colonel Walsh** felt it important to have the families of these new paratroopers involved in their lives. If family members would encourage their sons to do their duty they would be better fighting men. Colonel Walsh ordered each company commander to write a letter home to each paratrooper's parents. Bud started his career with F Company and here is the letter sent to his parents by his company commander.



Company "F" 517th Parachute Infantry Camp Toccoa, Georgia May 10, 1943

Dear Mr. Curtis:

Your son has been assigned to this company, and as his Company Commander I am writing to clarify any ideas you might have regarding the Parachute Troops and the men with whom he will be associated in his service to our country.

All Men accepted must be physically, mentally and morally in the highest bracket of American manhood, and they must have the capacity to absorb mental and physical training which will develop them into the finest soldiers in the world. You may well feel a high sense of pride in thefact that your son has willingly volunteered to serve his country as a "Paratrooper", a soldier whose distinctive uniform, bearing and soldierly appearance set him apart from other soldiers wherever he may go and gain for him the admiration and respect which the men in no other branch of theservice enjoy.

The moral, mental and physical well being of your son and the other in this unit is carefully provided for. The men are required to keep the barracks in which they live spotless at all times; sanitation is impressed upon all personnel and barracks, meals, etc., are inspected daily by an officer. Free Medical and Dental service are available and all men are required to take advantage of them. Attendance at religious services of all denominations is encouraged and there is a chapel in the area with a Chaplain on duty at all times to care for spiritual needs. For relaxtion a Recreation Room is provided in the area and there are supervised athletics. Later on men will be permitted to go into town on week-ends where there is a fine U.S.O. building for their use. Your son will be put through a gradual physical training process which will develop him into a superb soldier at the peak of physical efficiency.

Your son has received the golden opportunity of being associated with officers that are highly specialized in this type of work. These men were handpicked by the Regimental Commander who is a shrewd observer of leaders. ip. Within our organization the enlisted man and Officer have a common interest therefore they are closely united. It is this combination plus being the best trained, best equipped soldier in the world that will enable him to become the worlds finest fighting man.
