Today, Monday Oct 21st, I received an email from the son of the man who influenced my Dad to join the paratroopers, **Willard Hill**. He said this:

My wife and I bought a copy of Airborne Creed on DVD. While watching the Special Features we were amazed to learn from your interview that my father Willard J. Hill had influenced your father in deciding to go Airborne. My father was raised in Long Beach, California. He was ROTC at UCLA and married my mother in 1939. He belonged to the 82nd Airborne and was awarded the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and many other medals during the war.

This is what I put in the book that my father told me about Willard Hil:

"The next Sunday I attended church with my parents in the newly completed Park View Ward building on Ximeno Street in Long Beach, California. While there I saw an old friend who a few months before was my Sunday school teacher. He was dressed in an Army uniform. It was Willard Hill. He was now a Second Lieutenant and was wearing his Army officer's uniform. He was a paratrooper! He had jump wings on his uniform, and more impressive than that were his highly polished jump boots with his pant legs tucked into those boots. You could see your face in those highly shined boots. I had never been so impressed by a military soldier in my entire life. I was very impressed and wanted to know everything about the paratroopers. Willard told me how great it was to be a paratrooper. I believed every word Willard told me. I wanted to be a paratrooper! This type of adventure fit right in with my life style. I enjoyed danger. I challenged death on the rollercoaster (called the cyclone racer in those days) as a kid. I rode my bicycle sitting backwards on the handlebars using my hands to steer without seeing very well where I was going. I had moved out of my home at seventeen and I lived on my own. I did not take any guff from any person as I displayed with my school principal in San Francisco. I considered myself a perfect candidate for the paratroopers."

What a small world to actually hear from the son of the man who influenced my Dad to join the paratroopers.

Battle Braus: Reenactment - Col de Braus - 517th PIR/3 I company



Last weekend our 'Battle-Braus' association organized a reenactment in memory of 517 PRCT between I 'Escarène, the Col de Braus and Sospel (Alpes-Maritimes). This year emphasis was focused on the 3rd Battalion of the 517th Parachute Infantry Regiment so we conducted a commemorative 4-hour walk of in the footsteps of the "I" company departing from I 'Escarène-Touët station ending at the powder magazine of the Baisse du Pape and the I company assault on the head of the rockslide.

Paratroopers of the "I", cut off from the rest of their battalion located on the side of 'Braus' had to go down to fetch water at the bottom of the 'base camp'! (we also found photographs from time on the same premises).

During this time the column of vehicles reenacted a historical journey throughout the area of the fighting. On Saturday evening the men prepared fox-holes to spend the night on the "Pas de l'Agree". The next day 7 jeeps and trucks descended on Sospel by the strategic track because they were expected at Fort St Roch for the guided visit of the Maginot work (where the 517 were housed after the release of Sospel October 29, 1944).

We would like to thank all participants in this event as well as the President of association of Fort St Roch for the use of her home.

Mardy was one of the few ever to be chosen queen without a sorority affiliation.


66 years ago, she and her court rode a convertible in the parade and wore fur coats furnished by a downtown business.

NDSU's 1946 homecoming queen says women have it better now

FARGO — When Margaret "Marty" Anderson, now McMorrow, rode in North Dakota State University's 1946 Homecoming parade as the school's homecoming queen, she and her attendants wore fur coats on loan from a local fur store.

"I think fur is completely out nowadays," McMorrow said, citing one of the many ways times have changed in the 67 years since she reigned as homecoming queen.

McMorrow recalled her time as queen in an interview Friday, hours before she was scheduled to ride in NDSU's homecoming parade in downtown Fargo wearing a sash over a Bison sweatshirt. The parade was canceled due to inclement weather.

When McMorrow was chosen as queen, she was one of the few to win votes from the student body as an independent candidate without an affiliation to a sorority. At that time, all of the campus sororities put up a

candidate for homecoming queen, and one of them usually won.

McMorrow, who will turn 87 next month, said than in 1946, the year she was queen, it was the second year after veterans came back to campus after World War II. In the years before then, she said it was like going to an all-girls school.

Still, women at the college didn't have many options.

"You wouldn't even dream of going into engineering," she said.

McMorrow studied food and nutrition, made good grades and was involved on campus.

"I think this is a much better time for young women," she said

While McMorrow said she accomplished much more in college than winning the homecoming contest, the title was a big deal for her parents.

"The best thing I remember is my dad standing there with tears down his cheeks," she said.

Her parents took the train from Arnegard, N.D., to see her in the parade.

McMorrow's mother took a job as a bookkeeper to help put her through college, at a time when it wasn't common or popular to work outside the home.

"That was one of the reasons I wanted to do it all," she said.

McMorrow still has great pride for the school – though she's not a huge football fan, as it was always too cold wearing nylons and high heels at games, as was expected in 1946.

But her husband and two of her children also graduated from NDSU. Her youngest went to the University of North Dakota – which was against "family law," she said.

Former AIRBORNE SCHOOL, 82nd & XVIII AIRBORNE CORPS COMMANDER LIEUTENANT GENERAL RICHARD J. SEITZ passed away at age 95 on June 8, 2013 in Kansas. A Life member of the Association since 1967: LTG Seitz served as the Commander of the Airborne School (Ft. Benning -1950-53), 82nd Airborne Division Commander (1967-68) and later the CG of the XVIII and Fort Bragg from 1973-75. In 1939 he was commissioned as a 2LT in the infantry and in 1940 was called to duty as a Company Commander with the 38th Infantry; while in training at Fort Benning he saw the original Test Platoon and decided to become Airborne. Despite his Battalion Commander's objections, he became a paratrooper and later commanded the school. Upon graduating, LTG Seitz served with the 503rd PIR and in 1943 by then a CPT; he was selected to command the 2nd Battalion, 517th PIR. He was one of the youngest infantry commanders in WWII, 3 days short of his 25th birthday, and led the famed Task Force Seitz during the Battle of the Bulge. His unit was to have been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation Award for their gallant efforts (they lost over 400 out of 600 men) but a paperwork error prevented the issue; instead he earned a Silver Star. After WWII he served from 1947-1949 with the 11th Airborne Division. In 1958 he came back to the Airborne and was stationed at Fort Bragg as Commander of the 503rd Parachute Battle Group until June 1959 when he became the G3 for the XVIII Airborne Corps. Following service in Vietnam and with the Department of the Army; he was promoted to MG and in 1967 once again returned to Fort Bragg where he served as Commander of the Division during which the Division was involved in the Detroit Riots, the Golden Brigade was deployed to Vietnam and the Washington DC Riots following Dr. Martin Luther King's assassination. After his duty as CG was over, he once again left the home of the Airborne until his final assignment as the Commanding General of the XVIII Airborne Corps and Fort Bragg from 1973 until his retirement in 1975. LTG Seitz has been credited with the wearing of the maroon beret, the creation of the 82nd Division Chorus and with assisting in the creation of the Ranger School. He is survived by his four children; MAJ Rick Seitz, Judge Patricia Seitz, Dr. Catherine Seitz and Dr. Victoria Seitz. We lost two 596ers in August, **Al Kunzer** and **Bill Christian**, both of the first platoon. Both were born in New York state, Al upstate and Bill in Brooklyn. Later, in a telephone call to Illinois, I learned from his wife, JoAnn that her husband, the 596's **Dr. James Lyons** passed away on January 2012. He was one of three comrades who later became dentists. One of the Lyon's hobbies was the raising of buffalo and red deer. I remember Jim telling me that one had to be careful handling buffalo. He and JoAnn attended the St. Louis reunion some years ago, which Gloria and I missed. His son is now a dentist in Savannah, Georgia.

As I understand, **Al Kunzer** was a longtime specialist for a major upstate New York utility. Looking abck to 1943, Al said that our training after being drafted was relatively easy for him, because in his prior civilian life he was working over 60 hours a week, owing to the needs of the country at war.

After WWII, **Bill Christian** graduated from Dayton University, where he starred on the football team with Chick Noll (later head coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers). In the 1960's Bill and Sophia moved to Southern California. For many years he was a manager for the PBS television outlet in Hollywood, CA, which, because of its close association with the movie and television industry in the area, is one of the nation's two major PBS outlets (the other, New York).

Over many years, **Bill Christian** dedicated extensive effective effort work fir the 517th Association. Years ago, Bill and **Carl Kiefer** ran the national 517th reunion in Palm Springs. Beyond this, for many years, he and his wife Sophia, ran the West Coast minis held in PS each spring. Don't forget that he was preceded in this by **Jack Smothers** (the originator) and **Carl Kiefer**. In the last few years the **Gene Frice** family has succeeded Bill, and is now carrying the West Coast minis ahead.

Over the years many other 596ers did much for the 517th, including **Bob Dalrymple**, **Al Goodman**, **Joe Miller**, **Charlie Pugh** (our great organizer), and our current leader, **Allen Johnson**. THEY DID THE JOB.

As I see it, there are currently eleven 596 vets: **Bob Anderson** (Nebraska), **Bob Dalrymple** (Arizona), **Lyle Madison** (North Carolina), **Ed Phillips** (Maine), **Vince Podransky** (Pennsylvania), **Herb Reichwald** (Wisconsin), **Hal Roberts** (Washington), and **Manny Ventosa** (Washington).

Received 5 Battle Stars for combat-Rome-Arno, Italy, Invasion jump into Southern France 8/44, Ardennes (Battle of the Bulge), Rhineland, Germany, Central Europe. Also awarded the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart, Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, and World War II Victory Medal. After the war, he was with the Army Occupation in Berlin for three months. He then came back to the states via the Queen Mary. He was a retired engineer with Conemaugh and Blacklick Railroad with 38 years of service. Member of Hollsopple VFW Post 8861, Harmony Singing Society, Sons of Italy, Moxham Old-timers and longtime member of Oakbrook Golf Club, where he twice made a hole in one. Longtime usher and member of St. Andrew's Parish. Friends received from 2 to 8 p.m. Friday at John Henderson Co. Funeral Home, 215 Central Ave. Funeral Mass will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday at St. Andrew's Church, Father Angelo Patti.
