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This Week in 517th History

All elements of the RCT were quartered in Soissons by December 10th. Every American airborne unit in Europe was now part of General Matthew B. Ridgway's XVIII Airborne Corps. This included the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions just back from Holland and the 517th and other separate units up from the Mediterranean. Additionally, the 17th Airborne Division was now in England and was scheduled to come across to France in the near future.

During the night of December 15-16 the German army launched its last great offensive of World War II, striking with three armies against weak American positions in the Ardennes region of Belgium and Luxembourg. The Allies were taken totally by surprise. The Germans made their main effort with the Sixth SS and Fifth Panzer armies, while their Seventh army on the left made a limited holding attack.

Movement orders came for the 517th and 1100, December 21st. One Battery of the 460th and a platoon of the 596th were attached to each rifle battalion for movement.

All I am Charlie Pugh's daughter.

I was introduced to a woman from St Marie de Callian by the mayor.

In Dec I will be visiting the daughter (now 84) of a Jewish family who lived in the open but hiding their Jewish religion. They lived at the small hotel in the heart of town. She lives in NYC now and emigrated in 1952.

They lived in the small hotel for four years where they pretended to be Catholic. They had left Paris and were avoiding risks of being sent to camps or killed. She says her mother met 6 American men (including my dad) on Aug 14. She also explained that the French families hid the paratroopers in cars and drove them to the intended drop zone. They took farm roads to avoid Germans in nearby towns.

I am looking for stories, names and photos to show her.

Her family left St Marie de Callian right after the paratroopers left and they returned to Paris (although not directly). They returned to an abandoned and emptied apartment in Paris.

Her father was familiar with working with chemicals and other things before the war. He worked with the resistance to blow up trains in other areas farther away from St Marie de Callian. (I believe that he selected hiding in that town precisely because it had no train, navigable river or other assets).

While the atrocities against Jewish people are beyond imagination, I find it impressive that none of the 1,200 or so people in the town turned them in.

Do any of you remember this story or remember meeting her parents?

I send holiday greetings from my 90 year old mother, Ann.

The picture on pg. 7 is the front view of Richard with me, **Katherine D. Kramer Wheeler.**


We were 63/83 at that time. It is a wonderful picture; he would have loved it! Richard died at age 87 in 2011. I gasped when I saw the

I will bring about \$160 worth of liquor that is left over from last year, plus I will probably pick up another \$100 or so worth of Beer and Wine so we will have a good time.

Bob you are correct those our pictures of **Lissne**r. Know how to tell? He was the shortest officer in the 2nd Batt. but he stood tall in all other ways. He was a man's man! The last time I spent any time with him was at **Jim MacKinseys** funeral in Arlington. John did the Meditation and had all of us in tears. I don't have much of a memory but I believe he is the God Father of either Jim's daughter or Pat Seitz. When he retired he lived in Fort Walton Beach, FL. I didn't know it but that's only about 150 miles from my house. He passed on shortly after the funeral.

Lory the story about your Dad's first days in Toccoa could have been me. He was right on about what went down. I arrived about the same time as he did. The Guy that talked me into going into the Paratroops was right in front of me in the Mock up and he refused to jump. He was already out of the barracks when we returned that night and was sent to the Service Company. Next time I saw him he was filling up our Coal Bin (we had coal burning stoves). When we left Toccoa he was sent to a Tank outfit and a German dropped a Potato Masher (grenade) in his tank and he was killed. I enjoyed jumping from the tower which got me into a bit of trouble. I asked Lt. Alicki if I could jump again and I learned some new words before he was through with me.

Last subject is the reduction of troops letters that Lory furnished. To me this is very wrong and dangerous. I would like to say how I really feel about this subject but Bob has explained in a very nice way not to get political. That's all folks.

I'm writing because i have been doing some research on my grandfather who died when i was a baby. and I have some evidence that is making me believe he may have served with the 517. One being the 17th airborne division badge and his wings pin. He has no unit badge i can find. He was a marksmen with rifle and carbine. He also trained at Fort Benning TN.

Also because he has the original 517 brochure with autograph page and actual names written in it. One of whom i found actually on your contact list Richard Kalachalsky.

I'm not sure the origin of the brochure there's no way he got it in the 80's. for he was extremely ill then. Although his discharge papers have him in the organization of the 681st glider.

he has none of their badges or anything from his uniform which would affiliate him with them. so this part is basically confusing me.

His name was **Charles L. Farley.** if you have any info or suggestions for me to be able to identify which unit he actually served with it would be greatly appreciated.

Hi Greg,

On a quick look through my records, I do not see your grandfather listed. But the records are very incomplete.

I can tell you that **Richard Kachalsky** was with the 517th PRCT, as part of B Battery of the 460th Parachute Field Artillery Battalion. He is not listed on the Christmas 1944 record as such, and neither is Farley. But they could have left earlier, joined after, or been reassigned at that time. The 460th did train at Camp MacKall and Fort Benning, and was part of the 17th airborne before joining the 517th. The 681st Glider was also a Field Artillery Battalion and part of the 17th.

I do have a little more info on Kachalsky. He did attend some reunions of the 517th, including Portland, OR in 2006. We (I) have not heard from Kachalsky in a few years. I have an old home address for him in Yonkers, NY.

Before we chase that, can your read any other names from the 517th book? I can't imagine that he would save the book or have it autographed if he didn't know the men. Let's see if we can confirm B Battery with a couple of other names. Compare the names against the Xmas 1944 roster: http://517prct.org/documents/xmas1944/xmas 1944 battery b.jpg

Please let me know if you come up with more names and we can search some more.

I will include your note in the next 517th MailCall newsletter, going out tomorrow, and see if anyone else might have some recollections or ideas.

There is a **Vernon Cowgill** is listed on the December 1944 roster. Hodge is not. But both Hodge and Cowgill were definitely with B Battery. See photos at http://www.517prct.org/photos/john harte/john harte/460 b company1.htm

So I am thinking it's a good bet that your granddad was with them in B Battery at some time. That 517th booklet was written and distributed in Joigny France near the end of the war in March 1945.

Hello,

My name is Florent Plana, I'm a 22 years old French student and my major is history, I live in South East of France. I have a great interest in History and particularly in World War II. My great grand father who was a veteran of the First World War was a resistant in Normandy during the second World War. My grand-father was deported in Germany in a work camp. My grand-father never talked about the war to his children, he just wanted to forget this period and have a normal life. He began to talk about the work camps 10 year ago when my sister and I founded old papers, an identity card, and decorations that belonged to him and to my great grand-father. He is now 91 years old and I know how lucky I'm to have a grand-father who can explain to me what happened for him 70 years ago. In his village, approximately 30 young men were sent to German work camps. Today, only 2 are still alive ...

In 2005, I met for the first time a US Army veteran. My sister was an exchange student in Sycamore, Illinois and one of her neighbours was a Pearl Harbor veteran. I was so honoured to talk to a him, I was fascinated by his stories and I really enjoyed listening to him. In august 2009, I worked for a month in the First Division Museum located in Wheaton, Illinois and I had the chance to meet WWII veterans,_10 of them were veterans from the 745th Tank Battalion who landed on Omaha Beach on june 6 1944.

Sadly, only fews WWII veterans are still alive today and it will be more and more difficult to be able to speak to them, in particular for a French student who lives on the other side of the Atlantic.

I'm writing to you, in order to get in touch with WWII veterans who would like to speak about their stories.

Subject: New U.S. Army Rifle!!!

The MXT135 Counter Defilade Target Engagement System has a range of roughly 7,800 feet - and is to be deployed in Afghanistan soon. I would call it the "Equalizer." Some call it the "Punisher".

The rifle's gun sight uses a laser range finder to determine the exact distance to the obstruction, after which the soldier can add or subtract up to 10 meters

from that distance to enable the bullets to clear the barrier and explode above or beside the target. Soldiers will be able to use them to target snipers hidden in trenches rather than calling in air strikes.

The 35-millimeter round contains a chip that receives a radio signal from the gun sight as to the precise distance to the target.

Lt. Col. Christopher Lehner, project manager for the system, described the weapon as a 'game-changer' that other nations will try and copy.

The Army plans to buy 42,500 of the MXT135 rifles this year, enough for every member of the infantry and special forces, at a cost of \$11,900.00 each.

Lehner told Fox News: "With this weapon system, we take away cover from [enemy targets] forever. Tactics are going to have to be rewritten. The only thing we can see [enemies] being able to do is run away."

Experts say the rifle means that enemy troops will no longer be safe if they take cover. The MXT135 appears to be the perfect weapon for street-to-street fighting that troops in Afghanistan have to engage in, with enemy

fighters hiding behind walls and only breaking cover to fire occasionally.

The weapon's laser finder would work out how far away the enemy was and then the U.S. Soldier would add one meter using a button near the trigger.

When fired, the explosive round would carry exactly one meter past the wall and explode with the force of a hand grenade above the Taliban fighter.

The army's project manager for new weapons, Douglas Tamilio, said: "This is the first leap-ahead technology for troops that we've been able to develop and deploy."



A patent granted to the bullet's maker, Alliant Tech systems, reveals that the chip can determine how far

it has traveled. Mr. Tamilio said: "You could shoot a Javelin missile, and it would cost about \$69,000. These rounds will end up costing \$45.00 apiece."

They're relatively cheap. Lehner added: "This is a game-changer. The enemy has learned to get cover, for hundreds if not thousands of years. Well, they can't do that anymore. We're taking that cover from them and there's only two outcomes: We're going to get you behind that cover or force you to flee." The rifle will initially use high-explosive rounds, but its makers say that it might later use versions with smaller explosive charges that aim to stun rather than kill.



Army to Field New Type of Parachute

The U.S. Army and other services will soon begin fielding the first new type of parachute in decades, the service said.

The product is known as the Military Free Fall Advanced Ram-Air



The new rig is made by Airborne Systems, part of Solon, Ohio-based HDT Global, and commercially marketed as the Intruder. Consisting of a main parachute, reserve parachute, harness and container, it's designed to give troops more maneuverability.

"This parachute allows you to land everybody within a 25 to 30 meter circle, instead of having all your guys spread out wherever the wind carried them along the drop zone," Sgt. 1st Class Nicholas Ford said in a recent Army video.

Ford is the air detachment platoon sergeant at Fort Hood, Texas, for Company C, 2nd Squadron, 38th Cavalry Regiment, 504th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade, III Corps.

His soldiers recently tested the parachute in static-line jumps from UH-60 Black Hawk helicopters. Previous evaluations involved paratroopers jumping from such aircraft as the C-127 and C-23.

The parachute is also designed to give troops more carrying capacity. The RA-1 can carry upwards of 450 pounds — 100 pounds more than its predecessor — and safely deploy from 3,500 feet to 25,000 feet, according to a recent article on the website of the base's newspaper, the Fort Hood Sentinel.

The Army has previously said it plans to begin fielding the product in April 2014. It wasn't immediately clear how much the new system costs and how many units the service plans to buy.





John J. J. Lissner and the Mulligan Guards

Lissner was the Founder and Commander of the Mulligan Guard and Patron Saint of the Hidey Ho Club in Southern Pines, NC, which was probably rebuilt several times over with generous contributions from the 2nd Battalion members of the Mulligans Guard.

It was one of my great pleasures to have known Col. Lissner. He was a fine man whose service and positive influence on people's lives extended well beyond his military career.

Richard:

You have the words to the "Mulligan Guards Song" nailed. It has been a long time since I have heard/read those words.

John Lissner, Co. F introduced that song to the 2nd Battalion 517th at Camp Toccoa in 1943. He then organized a 517th Chapter which held regular weekend meetings at the Hidey Ho (approximate spelling) Restaurant just outside of Camp Mackall on the road that led to the Town Of Toccoa. I believe that the County was dry at the time which made little impression on the owner at the time as long as arrangements were in place with the local Sheriff.



John explained to us newly introduced numbers to this Society that the song originated in McSorley's Saloon in Brooklyn and was revered by all who attended this elite bastion of Irishness. John's approach was not very democratic as he very early on established his standing as the Number One "Himself" and personally selected those he considered to be privileged enough to join the 517th Chapter of the Mulligan Guards. It was a small membership as I recall and although I do not remember all of the members selected I do know that **Dick Seitz** was high on the Membership List as was **Carl Starkey** Co. D., **Bob Newberry** Co E., **Dave Armstrong**Co. D, **Bob Clauer** 2nd Bn Hq. Co., and a few others were also include. I made the cut as did my wife Bette who. I believe was the only female permitted membership. She still has her Mulligan Guard Membership Card to this date. (see above)

The normal pattern for the Hidey Ho Mulligan Guards Meetings always included a ritual marching up and down the long table used for these meetings by "Himself" who lustily bellowed the Mulligan Guard Song, you so ably recalled, and without pausing or losing his marching cadence managed to poke several holes in the ceiling. This made the evenings a rather costly affair. Needless to say this restaurant was rebuilt many times over by not only the 2nd Battalion but by the 1st and 3rd Battalions as well, Sometimes the final event was a rather poorly executed version of close combat activities that took place in the parking lot with little or no damaged being done to the contestants due to their relaxed condition at the time. The restaurant may have been named the Hidey Hole but my memory conjures up the name of Hidey Ho. However, this could be settled by one of the most active of the participants who no doubt remembers most of the events that took place there and a few he might like to forget. I refer to none other than our glorious leader, the C.O. of the 2nd Bn. who had, at various times the SCR 300 Radio call sign of "Dangerous Dick".

Richard, I want to thank you for helping me to revive some wonderful memories of the past. I only wish that **John Lissner** were present to tell his version of the Mulligan Guards History and the numerous spell binding and harrowing close calls with the US Army Manual For Military Justice that tested this valiant social group.

I finally found Bette's Mulligan Guard Card after turning my office upside down as a result of Bob's Message.

I am mailing the card to you tomorrow. You can return it to me at the Florida Mini Reunion. It would be difficult to send it by email as you will note when you read it. I will however try to describe the card as best I can. Here goes:

The Mulligan Guard Membership Cards were






not issued to the membership until 1953.

Bette's card was signed by **John Joseph James Lissner** as Chief Guardsman on January 18, 1953. Her Card is Numbered Number 26. The top of the Card indicates John's assignment at the time the card was issued was with the 3rd Battalion, 503rd Airborne Infantry Regiment. I believe it was commanded at that time by our own then Colonel Lou Walsh. The card reads: "This Is To Certify That Guardsman Mrs. **Bette Cross** #26 is a Loyal and Tested Member of the Airborne Mulligan Guards. Date of Warrant: 18 Jan 53. Signed **John Joseph James Lissner**."

The following comment was written on the reverse side of the Membership Card:
"Includes spouse if an original Guards Man." It was initialed JJJL. The reason for this comment was twofold. First, I had lost my card and he wanted to make it clear that I was beholding to Bette for membership perks. Secondly, the Chief Guardsman had ordained that Members who did not have a card in their possession at the time of a social engagement could be challenged and if they did not have their card or some special dispensation such as being officially



authorized, as in Bette's case, to have an endorsement initialed by John then that Guardsman had to stand payment for all drinks consumed by fellow Guardsmen then present. It was his way of making certain I was fined if Bette was not present.

This cost me a lot of jump pay because wives were not encouraged to visit their husbands during the work week while we were at Camp Toccoa. **Lou Walsh** did permit the married officers, which were few in number, to go home to their wives in the Town of Toccoa on Saturday night and Sunday nights but come Monday, AM had to be present for the early morning run. I guess this does it for now.

My father-in-law, Richard E. Anderson, passed From: Brooklyn Park, MN55444 away today (12-10-13). He was in Battery D, 460TH FAB.

Army Christmas Operations Order 00-5689: Subject: Christmas

- 1. An official visit by MG Santa (NMI) Claus is expected at this headquarters 25 December 2013. The following instructions will be in effect and govern the activities of all personnel during the visit.
- a. Not a creature will stir without official permission. This will include indigenous mice. Special stirring permits for necessary administrative actions will be obtained through the C1. Mice stirring permits will be processed through the C2 for proper clearances and obtained through Veterinary Services, ARCENT-KU.
- b. Personnel will settle their brains for a long winter nap prior to 2200 hours, 24 December 2013. See MAJ Dickenson for pre-napping medical requirements. See MAJ Adams for napping demonstration. Uniform for the nap will be: Pajamas, cotton, light, drowsing, with kerchief, general purpose, camouflage; and Cap, camouflage w/ear flaps. Equipment should have been drawn from homestation CIF prior to deployment.
- c. Personnel will utilize standard Sharq Market sugar plums for visions to dance through their heads. Artificially sweetened plums are authorized for those in the unit weight control program. Specifications for this item will be provided by the servicing dining facility.
- d. Stockings, wool, cushion sole, will be hung by the chimney with care. Necessary safety precautions will be taken to avoid fire hazards caused by carelessly hung stockings. ARCENT-KU safety officer will submit stocking hanging plans to this headquarters prior to 0800 hours, 24 December 2013, ATTN: MAJ Salada, for approval.
- e. At the first sign of clatter from the lawn, all troops will spring from their beds to evaluate noise and cause. Immediate action will be taken to tear open the shutters and throw open the window sashes. PMO Plan (Saint Nick), Reference LO No. 3, paragraph 6c, this headquarters, 2 February 2013, will be in effect to facilitate shutter tearing and sash throwing. Section OICs will familiarize all personnel with procedures and are responsible for ensuring that no shutters are torn open nor window sashes thrown open prior to start of official clatter. See CPT Donley for hardcopy.
- f. Prior to 2400, 24 December 2013, all personnel will be assigned "Wondering Eye" stations. After shutters are thrown open and sashes are torn, these stations will be manned.



- g. SSG Bekono will assign one each Sleigh, miniature, M-66, and eight (8) deer, rein, tiny, for use of MG Claus' driver who, in accordance with current directives and other applicable regulations, must have a valid SF56 properly annotated by Driver Testing; be authorized rooftop parking and be able to shout "On Dasher, on Dancer, on Prancer and Vixen, up Comet, up Cupid, on Donner and Blitzen".
- 2. MG Claus will enter quarters through standard chimneys. All units without chimneys will draw Chimney Simulator, M-6, for use during ceremonies. Chimney simulator units will be requested through SPC Oswalt on Job Order Request Form submitted to the Furniture Warehouse prior to 19 December 2013, and issued on DA Form 3161, Request for Issue or Turn-in.
- 3. Personnel will be rehearsed on shouting "Merry Christmas to all and to all a good night." See LTC Pride for demonstration. This shout will be given on termination of General Claus' visit. Uniformity of shouting is the responsibility of section NCOICs.
