

Dear Mrs. Gess:

This is to inform you that the remains of your loved one have been permanently interred, as recorded above, side by side with comrades who also gave their lives for their country.

Customary military funeral services were conducted over the grave at the time of burial.

After the Department of the Army has completed all final interments, the cemetery will be transferred, as authorized by the Congress, to the care and supervision of the American Battle Monuments Commission. The Commission also will have the responsibility for permenent construction and beautification of the cemetery, including erection of the permenent headstone. The headstone will be inscribed with the name exactly as recorded above, the rank or rating where appropriate, organization, State, and date of death. Any inquiries relative to the type of headstone or the spelling of the name to be inscribed thereon, should be addressed to the American Battle Monuments Commission, the central address of which is Room 713, 1712 "G" Street, N. W., Washington 25, D. C.

While interment and beautification activities are in progress, the comstery will not be open to visitors. However, upon completion thereof, due notice will be carried by the press.

You may rest assured that this final interment was conducted with fifting dignity and solemnity and that the grave-site will be carefully and considentiously maintained in perpetuity by the United States Government.

Le retour de Leo Dean, « libérateur » de La Motte

Engagé dans le 517^e Régiment d'infanterie parachutiste, ce vétéran américain assistait hier à la cérémonie mottoise en l'honneur des alliés. De cette journée historique, il n'a rien oublié

90 ans, Leo Dean a bon pied. bon ceil. À tel point qu'il devait sauter hier en soirée dans le ciel varois. À quelques kilomètres à peine de l'endroit où, il y a 70 ans, il atterrit avec ses frères d'armes du 517º Régiment d'infanterie parachutiste. Une folie à son age? « J'ai encore sauté il y a quinze jours. Quand mon docteur me fait des remontrances, je lui réponds que c'est meilleur que les pilules qu'il me donne », rétorque le vétéran américain, un brin espiègle.

Cloué au sol par la faute d'un mistral trop violent, Leo Dean s'est donc retrouvé à la cérémonie de la Ferme du Mitan, assis parmi les siens, à écouter les discours des hommes politiques venus leur rendre hommage. À la question « com-ment vous sentez-vous au-jourd'hui ? », l'intéressé répond : Très bien, mais un petit peu triste en même temps. J'ai laissé tellement

Ses amis, enterrés pour la plupart au cimetière américain de Draguignan, Leo Dean a pris l'habitude de leur rendre visite. « Cela fait dix ans, depuis le 60° anniversaire du Débarquement de Provence, que je viens ici chaque année. J'ai besoin ir proche d'eux d'une cer-

Seconde Guerre mondiale sans une égratignure. Un miracle ! « Je suis petit », glisse-t-il pour simple explication. Avant de reprendre, plus sérieusement : « J'ai surtout eu de la chance. =

À l'évocation des batailles auxquelles il a participé, on n'en doute pas. « Je me souviens de tout, ou presque », assure Leo Dean. Et d'enchainer : « Avant de sauter sur La Motte, j'avais suivi quinzejours d'entraîne ment au combat au nord de Rome. Mais vous pouvez vous entraîner autant que vous voulez, quand on vous tire dessus, ça rend nerveux. (...) Neuf jours après La Motte, on libérait Cannes, puis Sospel. »

Leo n'en avait pas fini pour autant avec la guerre. « Après Sospel, on a été envoyé dans le nord de la France, à Sotssons plus exactement. On a alors combattu les troupes alleman-des le long de la frontière belge huit semaines durant. + Et toujours pas

La chance, Leo Dean l'a encore connue quand, coup sur coup, l'en-nemi a capitulé avant que son régiment ne soit encore envoyé en première ligne. « En avril 1945, mon régiment était pressenti pour être parachuté en Allemagne. Mais cette


