That allowed the flag-bearer, once the camera was past him, to run around behind the cameraman and set up on the other side. Apparently there was only one flag? I may be mistaken, but the trooper holding the flag on the left does appear to be a twin of the flag-bearer on the right. – BB

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (U.R)— Secretary of War, Stimson revealed today that 500 men are training at Ft. Benning, Ga., as the first parachute troops in the U. S. army.

In last week's MailCall, there was some discussion about the number of weapons that Dunlevy was carrying in the magazine cover photo, including the M3 "grease gun" over chest. I found this website which describes some of the weapons used in WW2 by Rangers and paratroopers: http://www.2ndrangerbattalion.org/weaponry.html

M3A1 SUBMACHINE GUN

The M3 "Grease Gun" (more formally United States Submachine Gun, Cal. .45, M3/M3A1) was a submachine gun developed by the United States during World War II as a cheap substitute for the Thompson. It was nicknamed the Grease Gun because of its resemblance to an automotive grease gun, and because it contained an oil reservoir in the grip.



When World War II began, the Thompson submachine gun was

the standard U.S. submachine gun. However, the Thompson was comparatively expensive in terms of machining and time to manufacture. The .45 caliber M3 was adopted in 1942, designed specifically for simplified production using pressed and stamped metal parts. The gun was made by welding two pressed-metal shells together to form the exterior of the weapon. Far easier to manufacture than the Thompson, the M3 incorporated several updated design features, including a barrel that detached without tools, and a bolt that rode on two wire guide springs. A low cyclic rate of fire and straight-line recoil thrust made it easier to control than many other submachine guns, especially during automatic fire, though the spindly wire-frame stock fit few users and was rather too short.

The M3 was designed to be a disposable firearm once damaged or disabled, and no spare parts were provided to Army ordnance commands. This decision proved to be a minor catastrophe after inevitable supply bottlenecks caused reserve stocks of the M3 to run out in certain commands, forcing ordnance technicians to make emergency repairs and fabricate pawl springs in order to provide frontline units with operating weapons.

The M3 used the blowback method of operation. It could be fired only in fully-automatic mode, but experienced soldiers could usually fire single shots with it due to its very low rate of fire (400–450 rounds per minute).

Not surprising, this website does not have anything listed about the "M-1918 knuckle knife strapped to his right leg". With some quick Wikipedia research, I'm thinking that Dunlevy's knife is actually a Mark 1 "knuckleduster" trench knife: http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Trench knife

Belgian Bride at Orange Has Wedding Gown Made From Husband's Parachute

ORANGE, June 8.—The latest Orange acquisition is a 19-year-old bit of brunct loveliness from Belgium, who arrived this week to reign over an apartment at 318 Knox avenue and try "very hard to become an American just like Jue"

"Jos" is Ex-Sgt. Joseph Sanford, son of Mr. and Mrs. James F. Sanford of 26 Eighth street, who collected a wife along with a Purple Heart and two Oak Leaf clusters during his overseas service with an Army Airborne division. She is Anna Elsen Sanford, daughter of the late Eduord Elsen, member of the Belgian Underground, and Mrs. Elsen of Antwerp, Belgium.

She arrived at New York aboard the Santa Paula, and was chosen from several hundred was brides "the prettiest girl aboard ship."

Gown From Parachute

One of the limited number of items Anna was able to bring across is an exquisita wedding gown she fashioned from Joe's parachute and in which she was married to him on Dec. 18, 1945, at Antwerp. They were married first by a Belgian of lioial after they had hurdled much governmental and U. S. Army red tape and later in a cathedral of the Protestant churches of the U. S. armed forces.

The couple became acquainted in a little dress shop in Brussels, Belgium, where Anna was employed and where Joe had gone to get a rip sewn up in his blouse. Began a romance which survived the horrors of the Battle of the Bulge and thrived through a long period when Anna thought the boy dead while he lay in an English hospital fighting for his life after receiving his fifth wound of the war.

After Joe was sent back to the States, Anna completed her course in English, self-taught from a French-English dictionary, and also coached her mother and brother to learn the language so that she could practice conversation. In the meantime, Joe rented and furnished their apartment in Orange.

Anna likes America "very much" and is overjoyed at conveniences at the disposal of the American housewife. True to the tradition of Beigian women, this pretty five-foot, two-inch, 105-pound bride is expert at cooking and sewing

Anna was glad to learn that she does not have to scrub floors down on her hands and knees with a brush as they do it in Belgium.

When asked if soap is still rationed in her country, site answered that it is and that their linens and all white clothing are spread out on the grass for bleaching in the sun

British Bomb Killed Sister

The greatest tragedy in Anna's life occurred when her 12-year-old sister was killed in April, 1943, along with 750 other children and around 2000 adults of occupied Antwerp. They were bombed by the British who were attempting to hit a Gorman multition factory. Anna does not feel kindly toward the British

She is confident that her marlings will be a success and says she will devote her full time "to making Joe happy." When asked what she thought of America's going in for small families, she produced a Belgian booklet, which is given all newly-married couples and which contains columns for registering 14 offsprings. "Some couples I know had to go back for another book," she atted

"Some couples I know had to go back for another book," she stated in that delightfully accented English of hera, "but I think two or maybe four children will do."

Your long shot has paid off, it is the same **Joe Sanford** of B Battery.

His marriage to Anna was very short lived however. They divorced soon after her arrival in Texas. Joe and my dad were best buddies from Camp Toccoa thru the war till they parted ways during the Bulge. Attached are some notes that Joe wrote down in the 1980's. I have no idea how he got separated from the 460th and wound up with the 101st near Bastogne, he may have been wounded and left with them.

The irony is that Joe carried a photo of my dad's baby sister with him and insisted that he was going to marry her when the war was over while dad let him know he wasn't going to allow it. They did go on a date after he divorced Anna but nothing developed. Dad re-enlisted in 1948 in the 82nd Airborne artillery and after his hitch was over married Joe's sister Ann (my mom) in 1953. Joe was best man and during the ceremony whispered to my dad that he wasn't going to allow him to marry *his* sister. They both had a good laugh during what would have been a solemn moment. Attachment is from the same newspaper "The Port Arthur News".

Leah and I returned to Southern France last month to observe the 70th anniversary of Dragoon but our jump on Le Muy got weathered out. As a consolation I did get to fire the 75 Pack Howitzer at the Valbourges Estate!
