Regarding the location where the ambush **Allan Johnson** remembers occurred:

I stopped the study for my book west of the Callian area, so have not looked into this in detail. In my experience, the best way to find out exactly where such an event occurred is to interview locals, or try to find a trace of the Germans who were killed in the ambush. In this case however, I have not tried to interview the locals, and so many German died in the general vicinity of Draguignan without their exact location of death being recorded, that no proper reconstruction of events can be made. So in short, I do not know where this ambush that Allan Johnson remembers occurred.

Bob, The PDF format is working great for me so far. I have trouble getting things out of there once in a while, but just one click and that's all it takes for this program. For a computer duffer, it works !!!!!

Another matter: I have been trying to get compensation for my "wounds", but since all records were burned (where have you heard this before?) and all my buddies that might know the particulars in my case are

either gone or can't be located.. If the daily reports of Co. 1st Plt. (probable dates of evacuation, 3rd, 4th, 5th. of Jan. 1945) and the latter part of June 1945 when I got back to the outfit in Joigny could be located it would be a big help in my case. Anyone know where these documents can be retrieved?? and how can I get a copy?

I have to add my AIRBORNE THANKS to you Bob for carrying on with Mail Call.. From all reports I've been privy to, the 517th is unique in Airborne Regiment Assn.s because of it.

Hi Marshall, I took a look for morning reports, but all I have for Company A is June 1944 through October 1944. I don't have the records for 1945.

#### **Bob Barrett**

Bob, I received this email from you and have looked through the MR's for Company A in January 1945. Attached you'll find a MR from Jan 8, 1945, showing Baird, Marshall W (ASN 38441144) and indicating he and "above (11) EM fr duty to ab sk in Hosp NBC LD basic status changed fr asgd to atchd unasgd." For some reason the reports from 1945 are not in the Excel spreadsheet; I'll get that fixed someday. The MR's for Company A (And almost all the other companies) stop in March 1945.

If this document is what he is looking for, and wants to use the information for any "official" requests, I suggest he request a copy from the National Archives. However, when I tried to look up the listed ASN, 38441144, shown for Marshall, the NARA-AAD-Fielded search did not return any information.

I am plugging away at the MR's, but I am finding that I will need to revamp some of the naming protocols; I've got the individual MR's named in several different ways. I am also finding that there are some dates of several company MR's that have not been transcribed into the spreadsheets. Don't know how that happened but that's why we "double check" the data, eh?

If there is anything else, let me know. Also, I didn't look past Jan 8-9, 1945, for any other entries for Marshall Baird. Let me know if I need to look further.



# 517<sup>th</sup> Parachute Regimental Combat Team

Many of the 517<sup>th</sup> members who visited France in recent years have met with Bruce when they tour the cemetery and at various memorial services. We noticed a recent post on Bruce's Facebook page he reported: "Came back from lunch today and met former Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff, **Admiral Mike Mullen** and his wife Deborah out in the cemetery. I spent about 45 minutes talking military history with them." When asked why the Admiral was at the cemetery, the Admiral responded that he was "following in his uncle's footsteps with the 517th Parachute Infantry Combat Team." 
