How to spend 2 days in New Orleans

One can always travel to New Orleans for the major parties -- think Mardi Gras and Jazz Fest -- but even after these big events, you can enjoy this fantastical city to the max. From live jazz seemingly on every corner to amazing Southern food to drinking outdoors, the Crescent City calls to anyone looking for fun and a truly good time. With that in mind, here's how to spend two perfect days in New Orleans.

DAY 1

For a true Southern breakfast, snag a table at the **Ruby Slipper Cafe** (multiple locations, therubyslippercafe.net). At this mini chain (there are four locations), you can get piles of fried chicken on buttermilk biscuits or sautéed Gulf shrimp swimming over a plate of steaming grits, all served in a casual, diner setting.

After this feast, explore the National WWII Museum (945 Magazine St., 504-528-1944, nationalww2museum.org), a three-building space hosting exhibits meant to show you the war through the eyes of the people who lived it. This means you can expect interactive displays, oral histories and more than 100,000 artifacts from that time period.

For lunch, enjoy the elevated Louisiana fare at chef Donald Link's **Cochon Restaurant** (closed Sundays; 930 Tchoupitoulas St., 508-588-2123, cochonrestaurant.com). Make sure to try the fried alligator and wood-fired oysters, two dishes that showcase local ingredients. Add smoked pork ribs with



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watermelon pickle, crawfish pie and a pint of Covington Pontchartrain pilsner, and you will be set. After that spread, it's the best time to sit back and relax on a cozy bus while taking an architecture tour of the city with **Preservation Resource Center** (prcno.org).

Now's a good time to grab a snowball at the 76-year-old **Hansen's Sno-Bliz** (4801 Tchoupitoulas St., 504-891-9788, snobliz.com), a seasonal spot dedicated to the frozen water and flavored syrup dessert prevalent around NOLA in the warmer weather.

Next, dinner brings us to Alon Shaya's new, self-titled joint, **Shaya** (4213 Magazine St., 504-891-4213, shayarestaurant.com). The young chef's Israeli cuisine sways drastically from traditional Southern food, which proves a nice break from the pork-saturated and butter-covered heaven that is New Orleans dining. Shaya also uses an impressive wood-fired oven to churn out the best pita in the state, possibly the country. End the night at **The Spotted Cat Music Club** (623 Frenchmen St., spottedcatmusicclub.com) for live jazz, blues and funk.

DAY 2

Start with a lighter, but just as NOLA-esque, breakfast of fresh beignets and dark chicory coffee at the famous **Cafe Du Monde** (multiple locations, cafedumonde.com). There are numerous locations nowadays, but the spot across from the French Market was the first and, some would say, foremost. It's also the perfect launching spot for a day wandering around the charming and historical French Quarter, an area laced with iron balconies, bars and shops all housed in brightly-colored buildings. As you walk around, keep in mind that you can take any alcoholic drink from a bar or eatery and enjoy it alfresco. Have a cocktail seated at the old-school bar in **Old Absinthe House** (240 Bourbon St., 504-524-0113, ruebourbon.com/oldabsinthehouse), or take a pickle-laden bloody Mary to go.

Stop in the **New Orleans Historic Voodoo Museum** (724 Dumaine St., 504-680-0128) to learn about the history of this dark magic, and pick up a couple charm and gris-gris bags to bring home. You can also get your palm read or tea leaves dissected at **Bottom of the Cup Tearoom** (327 Chartres St., 800-729-7148, bottomofthecup.com), an 80-year-old shop that indeed sells tea, but also features psychics.

Lunch brings us to chef and restaurateur John Besh's **Lüke** (333 St. Charles Ave., 504-378-2840, lukeneworleans.com), where you should fill up on oysters, seafood gumbo, roasted jalapeno grits and craft cocktails, all while sitting at the distinguished bar. From there go visit the wonder that is **Mardi Gras World** (1380 Port of New Orleans Place, 504-361-7821, mardigrasworld.com). As cheesy as it might sound, this establishment proves pretty awesome given you can walk through the rows of giant goddess, cartoon characters and animals that have graced many a parade.


Surprisingly, you are probably hungry after all that meandering, so you might as well head back to the French Quarter and dine at the eclectic **Arnaud's** (813 Rue Bienville, 504-523-5433, arnaudsrestaurant.com), established in 1918 by a French wine salesman. Say goodbye to Louisiana with its signature drink, the French 75 -- a tippie comprised of gin, lemon, sugar and sparkling wine, and grab another cocktail at the newly refurbished **Le Meridien Hotel** (333 Poydras St., 504-525-9444, lemeridienneworleanshotel.com) in its brand-new, New Orleans-themed lounge.

Yes the commendation is an original document (didn't realize you already had an example of one). As best I can tell, the inscription – in Dad's non-Palmer-method handwriting ;-{-) – says:

"This cannot be published in any newspaper, magazine or hung on any bar room wall."

I assume that Dad was recording what an officer/Sr. NCO told him when copies of the commendation were distributed.

Also enclosed is embarkation card for the Madawaska – don't know if you already have an example. And, there's an Illinois certificate of appreciation – evidently given to servicemen who served in WWII.


Another friend he connects with was bringing him a Wendy's hamburger the next day.



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In Memorium – Louis O. "Louie" Gelen



Louis O. "Louie" Gelen, age 91, of Crookston, MN, died late Wednesday evening, January 28, 2015, at the University of Minnesota-Fairview Hospital in Minneapolis, MN.

Louie was born at Aure, MN, near Bemidji, on February 13, 1923, the son of Olaf and Leora Gelen. He was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran faith, grew up on the family farm, and attended country school through the 9th grade. He worked with his father for several years before enlisting in the US Army on April 20, 1943. Louie served, during WWII, with the 517th Parachute Combat Team of the 82nd Airborne Division, and saw action in Rome-Arno, southern France, Ardennes, the Rhineland, and central Europe. As a paratrooper his most important jump was made behind enemy lines in the battle of Normandy. In recognition of his service to his country, a grateful nation awarded him the American Theater Service Medal, Bronze Arrowhead, European-African-Middle Eastern

Theater Service Medal, and Good Conduct Medal. Following his honorable discharge with the rank of Sergeant, Louie returned home and attended Bemidji State College. From 1947-1951 he served as Bemidji City Assessor, and on October 31, 1948 was united in marriage to Vera A. Lundmark at the First Lutheran Church in Bemidji. Vera's wedding dress was made from the material used in Louie's parachute. At her urging Louie made application to the Minnesota State Patrol School. After successful completion of the program he was hired as a State Highway Patrolman in 1952. During these years the couple was blessed with the adoption of their children, Lori and David. The Gelens settled in Crookston and Louie served with distinction during his 30-year career with the State Patrol, retiring with the rank of Sergeant in 1982. He enjoyed the respect and esteem of colleagues throughout law enforcement, and was known not only for his professionalism and fairness, but as someone who would always "have your back."

Louie's faith was very important to him, and he and Vera were devoted members of the Trinity Lutheran Church for over 60 years. He was a twenty-five year member of the Crookston Volunteer Fire Department, and generously gave of his time to the Tri-Valley Medical Assistance Program for the elderly, as well as, volunteering with the IRS doing tax preparation for the elderly and those who qualified as low-income. Louie was a 66-year member of Crookston's American Legion Post #20, and held lifetime membership in VFW Post #1902. In April, 2009, Louie, along with several WWII veterans from the area, participated in the Northern Valley Honor Flight. This was a two-day trip to Washington, DC, where visits were made to the World War II Memorial, Arlington National Cemetery, and other sites: and the opportunity to visit with dignitaries who shared with them the common bond of military service. The trip was an emotional and memorable experience for Louie and his companions, honoring their sacrifice and patriotism for a country loved so much by them all. For many years Louie was a welcoming figure in the pro-shop at the Minakwa Country Club, and when not working could often be seen on the golf course getting in a round with his regular foursome. He was fortunate enough in his lifetime to record 2 holes-in-one. In younger years, he also enjoyed bowling in one of the local leagues. Playing cards was second nature to Louie and he regularly enjoyed meeting his buddies for coffee at the Legion and getting in a 'few hands.'

Louie was devoted to Vera, and seeing them together defined the term soul-mates. For many years the couple spent winters in Arizona, enjoying time with their son and daughter-in-law, David and Lucy, and grandson, Jonathan. Very sadly, Vera passed away last October 22nd. Louie deeply mourned her loss and looked forward to the time when they would be reunited. His loving family will forever remember him for his kind and gentle nature, and the smile that was always present.

Family members include his daughter, Lori Gelen of Bemidji, MN; son and daughter-in-law, David and Lucy Gelen, and their son, Jonathan, of Chandler, AZ; sister-in-law, Florence Lundmark, of Bemidji; and many nieces, nephews, and friends. In addition to Vera, his beloved wife of 66 years, Louie was preceded in death by his parents, Olaf and Leora; 3 sisters, Florence Evje, Hazel Jallen, and Olga Gelen, who died as a teen-ager; and a special cousin who was like a brother, Fred Bakke. May God bless the memory of Louie Gelen.

COL. BOYLE RECEIVES DSC Gets 2d Decoration for Heroism in Battle in Belgium

The Distinguished Service Cross has been awarded to Lieut. Col. William J. Boyle, it was learned yesterday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William L. Boyle of 869 Sterling Place, Brooklyn. Colonel Boyle, previously the recipient of a Bronze Star and the Purple Heart with Oak Leaf cluster, received the DSC for "extraordinary heroism in action" as commanding officer, First Battalion, 517th Parachute Infantry, on Christmas Day, 1944, during the fighting in Belgium.

A graduate of St. Augustine High School in Brooklyn, he was a member of the West Point class of '39. He is now under treatment at Halloran General Hospital for serious wounds of both arms.
