### RE: Joseph J. Richardson, D Battery, 460<sup>th</sup>

Thank you both. I have not been able to identify my father Joseph J in any of the photos. I did go back to some of my notes and files for the following. Dad graduated Airborne School in 1943 after volunteering for paratroops while at Fort Lewis Washington. He talked **John Maletrich** who I believe is C Battery in the Christmas rooster to join him. Discharge shows transit to MTO 4/21/1944 to 5/11/1944 so he arrived before the 460th which I believe arrived 5/31/1944. In his papers was a hand written note on a short history of the 551st PIB that the was attached to the 551 from 6/1/1944 to 8/10/1944. 8/10 happens to be the date the 460th was sealed off before Southern France. Discharge states departed MTO 8/15/1944 arrived ETO 8/15/1944 with arrowhead. Was listed in Christmas rooster. Went on to Berlin I believe transferred to 82nd. Left ETO for USA 11/24/1945 arrived 11/30/1945. Discharge shows last unit Battery D 460th.

Subject: Company A at Camp Toccoa

In reviewing the 517 site on this memorial day, I came across some discussion on the photo for Company A at Camp Toccoa.

The link (<a href="http://517prct.org/photos/a\_co\_toccoa/a\_company\_camp\_toccoa\_1943.htm">http://517prct.org/photos/a\_co\_toccoa/a\_company\_camp\_toccoa\_1943.htm</a>) included the image forwarded by Roger Sullivan in 2011 with some referenced names by **Mel Trenary** of the unit.

This jogged a memory of a similar project that I worked with **Gene "Zoot" Snyder** of A Company at the 2010 Palm Springs Reunion involving scanning and stitching a marked up image with many of the names listed. The original source was credited to **Jack Smothers**. I "thought" I sent this on at the time, but it looks like it never was processed.

As an item of note, Roger has his dad as the 7th from the left, but the image lists him as the 7th from the right.

I will also go through some of the other scanning projects I was involved in at the time and make sure that you have copies.




Here is the file with the photo of the map of what I believe my uncle **Ralph Bajczyk** who was I think based on this find, a parachuter with the 517th, traveled in Europe during WWII. It lists the paths taken, Joigny, Bergstein, Paris, Luceran, Roma, Nice, La Roquette. It has caricatures as well as photos. I paid to get a digital scan made of it.

Here is what I know, **Ralph (Moose) Bajczyk** was born October 26, 1914, he passed September 25, 1978. He is buried at Wood National Cemetery in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Ancestry calls him my grand uncle, he was uncle to my father. The story passed down is that he was parachuted behind enemy lines on or about D-Day. When he returned he was not the same man, a little 'off'. This I have heard from my Dads Cousin, Shirley Gerhard (the one in possession of the map) and an aunt still living.

I did send you a photo a while back of this map, but you had asked for a better one, it took some time but I got it to a shop that was able to scan it and put it on a memory stick for me - I contacted you through facebook. The actual map is about 3 foot by 2 foot., if it was in a reunion book it would have been smaller (?)

If you know where to send it to preserve it, I think I may be able to ask my cousin to part with it. Her children are not very interested in genealogy and she had been discarding photos and such when I found her. There are very few Bajczyks' left out there and I am trying to preserve what I can find.

Buried at Henri Chapel Américan Cemetery Belgium He received the Bronze star, Purple heart .

I have been looking for information on Sgt. Albert Wise for some time now. He was married to my grandmother Beverly Ruth McMillion. I think they lived in Colorado Springs, CO. He died on January 5, 1945. The crazy thing is I was born on Jan 5 1977.... We have a few of his military honers and my goal has been to find his family and return them to them. I also have a telegram that Bev was sent about his death. That is really all the info I have. Until, today I have never seen a picture of him. I also knew that he was from California.

My grandmothers brothers was Dayton and Clarence McMillon. I've never had the chance to ask what they remember about Albert. I was hoping they could give me a lead on if he had any brothers or sisters. Beverly went on after Alberts death to marry my grandfather John "Jack" Bryce of Grand Ledge, Michigan. Jack just died last week. He was 93 years old. He was in the 100th bombardier. He flew in 35 missions in WWII.

I always think about this story because if Albert did not die at the Battle of the Bulge I would not be here today. History is a crazy thing....




#### Good afternoon!

Sgt. Andrew J. Murphy, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Murphy, 19 Westminster street, city, was killed in action in Italy on June 18, according to notification received by his parents from the War Department. Murphy was a paratrooper and was jump master of his squad. He enlisted two years ago and had been overseas since May of this year. Sgt. Murphy received his basic train-ing at Camp Coccoa, Fort Benning, Ga., and Camp Mackall, N. C. He was a graduate of Meyers High School and served as treasurer of his class. His father is a letter carrier at the Wilkes-Barre Post Office and a veteran of World War I. Besides his parents, Sgt. Murphy is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Frank, James, Clara > Cary Ellen
