Hello, I was wondering if you could help me. My entire life I was told my grandfather, **Chester Ogorek**, was in the 101st Airborne Division. He supposedly fought in Normandy, Market Garden and Belgium before getting gravely injured. He would tell me the stories when I was a child and he always said he was in the 101st and at Normandy. Recently I was able to get a copy of his discharge paperwork and it appears to list the 517 PIR as his unit and his date of injury as October 15, 1944, which would put it before the Bulge. I've enclosed a copy of the paperwork. It's not the best copy and I can probably make a better scan if needed. I know the 517 was never a part of the 101st and that they fought in different parts of Europe until the Bulge. He always told me he fought in Italy and then joined the 101st for Normandy. Is this possible? What does the paperwork say? Any way you can help me clarify some of this or maybe point me in the right direction? I really appreciate it. Thank you.

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Hi David, I did some research, but I am still stumped. On a quick search, I cannot find any records of Ogorek with the 517, but my records are very incomplete.

The discharge says 517th PIR, HQ Company, and Wounded in Action on Oct 15, 1944. The 517 did see some action in the maritime alps in mid-October but I do not have copies of those records. I only have the morning reports for HQ Co starting on October 24.

The discharge also says "Rome-Arno, Southern France, Rhineland", which are the primary locations of the 517th action (although Belgium and the Bulge is left out). And the 517th wasn't in the Bulge or the Rhineland until after October 15. Maybe when they put in the 517, they just added the locations of the 517th without looking up Chester's actual records. That seems unusual, but I cannot explain it, no matter what unit he was with.

In summary, I cannot verify whether he was with the 101st or the 517th. But if he was wounded in October 44, he probably did not make it to the Rhineland with either unit unless his wounds were not serious. It sounds like the injuries were serious.

Bob, thank you very much for your help. His wounds were very serious, he was hospitalized for over a year. Told me it was a German grenade. When he flexed his forearms you could see and feel the shrapnel pieces still in there. Pretty large ones. Use to freak me out as a kid :). It's odd, the paperwork did not say what I anticipated. I've always read and followed the 101st because that's what he used to say, now I'll have to learn more about the Battling Buzzards. Not sure why he would make stuff up though, considering the fighting he was involved in and the wounds he suffered. Thank you very much for your help. Any ideas on other ways to research this?
