

"Faith teaches you how to live with courage, how to live with honor, gives you something to strive for," said. U.S. Army Ranger Kris "Tanto" Paronto. "To me, that's the American spirit."

On September 11, 2012, terrorists attacked the U.S. Embassy in Benghazi, Libya. We lost four brave diplomats. While the incident will forever be remembered as a tragedy, we would be remiss to forget the courage displayed by the six American servicemen who ran toward the fire. It is their story that is told in the new Paramount Pictures film 13 Hours: The Secret Soldiers of Benghazi.

Thank you for the weekly updates. I believe the 517 had a baseball team. I believe that my dad, **Charles Pugh** and some of his buddies were on their baseball team.

In fact, now that 71 years has passed, I suppose it is ok to tell this story. I overheard this story told by another 517 member at my house. He said that the men dressed up in their baseball uniforms in Italy and caught the attention of some charming Italian girls. Afraid my dad put on the uniform of the umpire and a collar that sort of looked ministerial. He added a black jacket (not sure where he got the jacket) to look like a Protestant minister. In Italy they (chiefly led by my father as fake minister) performed some less than legal marriages of some (certainly not all) of 517 guys to unsuspecting but respectable Italian girls looking for marriage. My father was not proud of this chicanery in his later years. But at 17 -18 years of age (in 1943-44), what would one expect? I accidentally overheard the story and my dad was not too pleased that as a teenage daughter I heard this about him.

So yes there was a baseball team. I heard they also played baseball in France after the completion of Operation Dragoon in Southern France and awaiting the movement to Belgium in Nov 1944. They were awaiting equipment and supplies and spent some time with baseball. Some guys also got leave and went to other places in France. I think a few men were able to go to Paris in Nov. For a weekend. Sadly the winter uniforms never arrived before they moved into Belgium- to Battle of the Bulge. They fought in summer weight uniforms.

This is all I know about baseball and 517. (My father was also in 596 PCRT).

All that I described was discussed by some men and my dad- so I assume it is true.




SCORED ONE FOR VETERANS!!
