Hunter McDonald Jr.

Nashville, TN

Hunter McDonald, Jr., eldest son of Clara Gilliland McDonald and Hunter McDonald, died on July 15, 2016 at his home in Nashville, TN. A native Nashvillian, he was born on August 13, 1923, and was predeceased by his parents and his younger brother Robertson McDonald. He is survived by his wife of 69 years, Emmie Keith Jackson, son Hunter McDonald, III, and daughters Keith McDonald Barry (John),

Clara McDonald Milligan, and Cornelia McDonald Granbery (Hill). He is also survived by his younger sister Clara McDonald Bass, nine grandchildren and nine great- grandchildren.

He attended The Webb School, The McCallie School and The University of the South at Sewanee. As a proud member of the Greatest Generation, he served his country during World War II, having enlisted in 1943 at the age of nineteen. He served with the 517th Parachute Regimental Combat Team in the European theater of operation. His campaigns included: Rome-Arno, the airborne invasion of southern France, the Rhineland, the Battle of the Bulge and Central Europe. His 517th Regiment earned and was awarded the Presidential Citation for serving above and beyond the line of duty. Later he was assigned to the 505th regiment of the 82nd Airborne Division which was among the first American occupation troops in Berlin. He was awarded the purple heart medal, bronze star medal and five silver stars for each campaign as well as a combat infantryman's badge.

He was the owner and president of three family businesses, the Family Service Laundry, Fort Negley Laundry and Colony Cleaners. He was elected as President of the Southern Laundry Owners Association. In 1961, he was honored to have been selected by the United States Department of Commerce to serve as its representative to create business for American companies in Nigeria.

As a member of the McDonald Clan, he spent his summers in northern Ontario, Canada where the family has gathered at their cottages each summer since 1911. As a fixture on the lake, his advice and counsel was sought by all, both natives and summer residents alike. He took up the hobby of small aircraft flying in mid-life and belonged to the Old Hickory Flyers, where he served as President, and the Nashville Aerobatic Club. He often flew to the family cottage on floats and enjoyed exploring the area and sharing the flying experience with friends and neighbors.

His interest in flying took him to the Northern hinterlands, including the Arctic and the Northwest Territory of Canada, from Hudson's Bay to the Yukon Territory. On one memorable trip during the height of the Cold War, Roy Miles, his dear flying companion, and Hunter flew almost to Siberia; when warned by air traffic control that they were approaching Russian air space, they ignored the warnings and crossed over the international date line. Not fearing any consequence thinking that the authorities wouldn't bother with a small aircraft, the pair took numerous photos. As they reentered US airspace, they avoided repercussion by feigning radio difficulties. He lived his entire life with that same sense of adventure and daring; he was an inspiration to all who knew and loved him.

There will be a private burial service for the immediate family. The family will host a celebration of Hunter's life in the fall for all who would like to attend. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to Christ Church Cathedral, the University of the South at Sewanee, The Webb School in Bellbuckle, TN, or The McCallie School in Chattanooga, TN.

Dallas Lloyd Long, Sr., age 95, of Lithonia passed away peacefully at home Saturday, February 22, 2014. He was an incredible Christian and beloved husband, father, grandfather, and great grandfather. He was preceded in death by four sisters, and one brother. He is survived by his wife, Geraldine "Jerrie" Long; children, Donna Knapp (Dale) of Snellville, Deborah Mullen (Chris) of Charlotte, NC, Dallas Long, Jr. (Beth) of Baton Rouge, LA; grandchildren, Lauren Hammond (Kevin), Megan Walker (Chris), John Mullen and his fiancé Christine O'Neill, Justin Mullen, Rachael Mullen, Dallas Long, III; great grandchild Kyler Hammond, and soon to be great grandchild, Kolton Hammond; sister, Wilma Albert (Babe) of Kenton, OH; and sister-in-law, Barbara Long of Kenton, OH.

Mr. Long retired as a Warrant Officer from the Army Reserves. He was a true Patriot, a very talented craftsman, and an engaged, active naturalist.

A Funeral Service to Honor the Life of Dallas Lloyd Long, Sr. will be held Tuesday, February 25, 2014 at 11AM at Tom M. Wages Snellville Chapel. Interment will follow at Westview Cemetery. The family will receive friends Tuesday beginning at 9AM at the funeral home.
