The 139th Airborne Engineer Battalion (AEB) was constituted on 10 March 1943 at Camp Mackall, North Carolina (NC). It was activated 15 April 1943 at Camp Mackall, North Carolina under the command of **Lt Colonel Stanley Johnson**.

Company C, 139th Airborne Engineer Battalion (above), was redesignated the 596th Airborne (Parachute) Engineer Company. The 596th had a company headquarters and three platoons with an authorized strength of eight officers and 137 enlisted men. It was commanded by **Captain Robert Dalrymple**. He and his officers had been hand-picked, and had attended a 30-day course at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, prior to the Company's activation. The Engineers were lightly armed and equipped, but highly trained in their missions of construction and destruction. This training -- particularly in the removal of mines and booby-traps--was to stand them in good stead on the battlefields of Europe.

Hi Bob. In 2006 I had been involved in finding and excavating a mass grave of German soldiers in my hometown of Villeneuve-Loubet. Although this battle had not implicated the 517th, it had implicated the unit fighting right next to it in southern France, the US-Canadian First Special Service Force.

I have finally gotten to putting a video of the excavation online with English subtitles, and also photos showing the aftermath of the excavation, in other words the identification of some of the German bodies, and the contact with their relatives. Here is a link to the video:

Regarding **Private Gruwell**, the only 517th trooper who is missing in southern France, I can't go into to many details for the moment, but the people from DPAA (the branch of the US army responsible for the recovery of missing soldiers) were working in the field in southern France, and looking into some old graves. However we unfortunately did not manage to locate Gruwell and everything indicates that his body will never be recovered.

Exhumation by an archeologist and medical students of the bodies of 14 missing in action German soldiers from a mass grave in Villeneuve-Loubet, southern France, in 2006. The Germans had been killed in combat on August 26 1944, when Villeneuve was liberated by the First Special Service Force, shortly after Operation Dragoon, the invasion of southern France. Identification tags, helmets, ammunition, coins, buttons, and other artifacts were found with the bodies.

Following the exhumation, 8 of the bodies were identified. All were members of Reserve Grenadier Bataillon 372, of Reserve Division 148.

The journalist in the third newsreport says the German soldiers were executed. This is a mistake on her part, as the numerous shrapnel damaged items found in the grave prove.

I often see pictures of both modern factory-made recreations plus a few war-time examples on eBay. Your version does look like the older examples, and from the stitching, it does appear to be handmade. So I would put it as an early version. But I cannot tell you any more than what I know from our patch history:

I am getting as much information as possible for request for entry into the North Carolina Veterans Hall of Fame. I know he was wounded in October 1944 and returned to duty November 18th 1944. Hope things are going well. Everything fine here. I am making good progress on the Gruwell story. I hope the powers that be do not make many edits to it for the web site.



I am also hoping that Pvt. Gruwell's remains are found, but I would suggest that you keep your expectations low...very low. There is a man named Ted Darcy, who has been searching for the remains of WWII Soldiers, sailors and Airmen. His web site is, www.wfirg.com. Email him if you like about Pvt. Gruwell.

I've attached Pvt. Gruwell's IDPF for you. Do you know if any of the three Soldiers, Karsten, Istvanik or Tanner are alive? These are the men who discovered Pvt. Gruwell after the ambulance ambush and determined that it was indeed him by the stamp inside his paratrooper boots. The Army sent letters to them [copies in the IDPF], but Karsten was the only one who responded. I think the Army didn't have good addresses for the other two.

Dear Mr. Istvanik:

The Office of the Quartermaster General is endeavoring to assist the Graves Registration Service in the recovery of the remains of Private Robert R. Gruwell, 39277657, who was reported killed in action on 15 August 1944 in the vicinity of LeMotte, France. All efforts to date have failed to locate the grave in question.

Available records indicate that you were one of the mambers of the 517th Parachute Infantry Regiment that came across the remains of an American soldier on the road between Callian and Lamotte on 17 August 1944. At that time, a search was made for identification tags but none were found. The man's Paratrooper boots were removed and inside in indelible ink was the initial "G" followed by four numbers which were later determined to be the last four numbers of Private Gruwell's serial number. A HAR belt and clips were found near the body. Private Gruwell was a BAR man.

It would be greatly appreciated and very helpful if you will attempt to pinpoint the approximate site on the inclosed map where the remains were found so that further investigation can be conducted to locate the place of burial. Callian and LaNotte are circled in red on the attached map for your convenience.
