Subject: Earl Mangello, Co E, 517th PRCT

My father was **Pvt. Earl Mangello**, who was in Company E, 517th PRCT. I never knew him, he died in July, 1947 when I was 5 months old. I was given up for adoption and I never knew who my birth parents were until last year. I learned of Earl's WW2 service while researching him, and have been catching up on the 517th's history since. I even attended the 2017 Currahee Weekend last October.

I only have one photograph of him (Attached), which I found on Ancestry.com in the family tree of a distant relative. The original photo was folded in the middle, and the copy appears to be doctored as a result, looking washed out at the base of the mountain.

It appears to be a studio photo of him in uniform, likely taken at either Camp Toccoa or Camp MacKall. Could the hill in the background be Currahee Mountain? Are there any known photos of other paratroopers with the same backdrop?



I would also like to know if there are any resources that Earl's name appears in, such as morning or casualty reports. I have been in contact with Earl's half brother, and I learned that Earl landed in Italy and was wounded at the Battle of the Bulge. I assume that Earl also participated in Operation Dragoon.

Lastly, do you have a searchable database of stories of his fellow soldiers who may have mentioned him by name in any of their wartime reminisces?

I tried to get a copy of his DD214, but found that it was lost in the 1973 fire that occurred at the St. Louis records center.



Feel free to publish his photo in MailCall and any part of this request for information on him.

Hi Martin,

Glad to hear from you. I'll tell you what I can, but I don't have too much in my records. I don't see Earl Mangello mentioned specifically in the books or journals, but I can piece together a few things.

If he was with the 517th in Toccoa, they he did land in Italy, dropped into Southern France on August 14, 1944.

We know he was in Company E, and he is listed in the Christmas 1944 roster while in France, just before the Battle of the Bulge started.

So we know we was in France in December 1944 and with everyone else, he was soon sent to the Bulge in the Ardennes.

I did find some interesting morning reports for Mangello, some attached, which confirm he was with E Company:

July 24, 1944: south of Rome in July: AWOL at 0600 hr

July 26 1944: Looks like a correction – he wasn't AWOL, he was with the Military Auth. (MPs?) in Arno Rome. But he returned to duty on the 26th.




September 6, 1944: L'Escarene France: Hospitalized with NBC (Non-Battle Casualty) and transferred to 7th Army

October 21, 1944: Col de Bras, France: Rejoined company

Jan 3 1945: Trois Ponts in Belgium: LWA BC (lightly Wounded in Combat)

March 11, 1945: Joigny France: rejoined the 517th. Now PFC.



You can see from the Jan 3 1945 morning report that Jan 3rd was a tough day of battle.

MOS 7745 means paratrooper rifleman. 675 was a messenger.



I did find another photo with that same tropical background at http://517prct.org/photos/robert_a_harp/robert_harp.htm. So these were taken at Fort Benning, GA in March 1944. This was around the time the 517th began to prepare for Europe.

If you want to do more reading, there is the *Paratroopers' Odyssey*, which is on the website, or *Battling Buzzards* by **Gerold Astor**, available on Amazon. There is also an autobiography by **Gene Brissey** of E Company, who probably had an experience that was very close to what your father experienced.

Thank you so much for the information, the morning reports were something I never saw before. When I was at Toccoa last Fall, I met **Jim Kraus** from Phoenix who mentioned knowing you. I am glad that I finally inquired about Earl to you.

I am also saddened to see that your great uncle **Pvt. Robert Harp** died during the war. I imagine that you have some way to pass his memory down through each generation. I am putting together 2 shadow boxes for my grandchildren. I hope to include all the Airborne Division patches that he served under. I figure that they were the 17th Airborne, 18th Airborne, Allied Airborne, 82nd Airborne and the 13th Airborne. They were attached to the 82nd Airborne just after the Battle of the Bulge, were they not? Just not sure that they were considered to be under the 82nd.

Thank you for Robert Harp's photo and for the information that it was taken at Ft. Benning. Is the hill in the background supposed to be Currahee? I guess that you noticed that the photo that you sent was reversed. The photo that I found of Earl was reversed as well, so I flipped it and photo shopped the crease out of it. I sent you the finished product in my last email, but I attached both versions to this email.

Earl was married in 1943, 2 weeks before his wife gave birth to their only child (my half-brother). When Earl returned after the war she had moved on and they divorced. By May of 1946, he had met my mother on terms that I do not know, but I was conceived. He probably never knew that I was born and by July 1947, he would dead after falling from a bridge and drowning. I suspect that the photo taken of him at Ft. Benning was sent home to his wife at the time. It was passed on to her daughter from her second husband and that is how it ended up on Ancestry.com, where I found it while researching Earl's name.

I am 70 now, but I was 68 when I learned that my parents were not my biological parents. I did a an extensive 2 year search using DNA to determine who my birth mother and birth father were. I found Earl's enlistment record and from that I knew his unit and did enough research to learn of the Camp Toccoa weekend on the 517th website last October.



Thank you for all the work you did to get me the information contained in your last email, if you run across anything regarding **Earl Mangello**, please remember me.

The conclusion of General Eisenhower's review of the performance of American airborne forces during Operation Husky^[9]




BOB - THIS IS NOT FOR MAILCALL SINCE IT'S RELATED TO SERVICE IN KOREA (unless you think it's appropriate)









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Saw the dialogue on these men in the latest Mail Call.
