Hi Billy!

Nice to hear from you. I do see that your Dad was indeed with D Company of the 517th as PFC R. Billy Dean on the Christmas 1944 roster, printed in France just before the start of the Battle of the Bulge. http://517prct.org/documents/xmas1944/xmas 1944 company d1.jpg

I don't see any other specific mentions of him in any of the documents or books that I have, but my records are very incomplete. We do see him listed on the D Company morning reports on a few locations, including LIA BC ("Lightly wounded in action - Battle Casualty") in January 1945.

PFC 2-Dec-1944 34409220 7745 1 Mi W of La Colle, France

Above 3 EM fr duty to Abs Sk NBC LD.

PFC 5-Jan-1945 34409220 7745 1/2 Miles NE of Begeval, \Belgium

above (6) EM fr ab sk in Hosp NBC LD to duty.

PFC 25-Jan-1945 AGQ 34409220 7745 1/2 Mi N. of Wallerode, Belgium MOS 7745.

Dy to ab sk in hosp LIA BC. Basic status changed fr asgd to atchd unasgd.



7745 = Infantry rifleman

I don't know if you have much info on the 517 PRCT, but this was a very elite unit. One of the first elite trained paratrooper units, and possibly the only unit to remain as an independent Parachute Regimental Combat Team during the war, called upon to move into action quickly. 



Many of you have heard the story of my Dad, who was in the 517th Paratroopers, and I didn't really know what happened to him while he was in the Service. He died when I was 4 and all I remember is going to the funeral at Highland Cemetery in Ft. Mitchell, Ky. Right across the river from Cincinnati. After many hours of researching I finally found an article in the Official newspaper of the 517th that someone had taken a picture of and sent it to the 517th web site.

The Man with Half a Heart

by Col. Louis A. Walsh. Jr. 517th Commander 1943

Not many of us got to know Pvt. Jesse Ellington intimately.

We know he joined us at Toccoa and that he was ever robust, cheerful and uncomplaining. We know he made every march and run, that he never fell out or legged off. We know he qualified with all the weapons. We know he took Jump School in his stride and we know too, the place he held in the hearts of the men in his company. We know he was a little older than most and that he had a little daughter and two sons. What we didn't know that physically, he had but half a heart. Medically, this wasn't readily detectable. But Ellington knew. Why else the pain with each running

step? Why the shortness of breath? Yes, Ellington knew. He knew that and more. He knew why we were in this War and what we were fighting for. The only thing he didn't know was how to quit!

Let's do justice to this man who won't get a chance to fight with us on the battlefield. His fight is already won. He had given all that anyone can give. Let him live forever an be an inspiration to us.

The Regiment is assembled now--complete--a Parachute Regiment. You have won the right to wear your wings. Do it proudly and let each of you be the sort of man you'd want the man next to you to be. When the going is rough, as it is bound to be, and you think it is not worth it all, remember Ellington, the Man with Half a Heart, but a fighting one!

I am the brother of **Ishmael Ramos** (deceased) Company H who helped arrange for VP Cheney to speak at 517th Event in Washington, D.C. and sat next to **General Seitz**

My mother in-law Tillie Valenzuela was a welder during WW II on ships at Long Beach, CA. She was a single mother raising two daughters, one is my wife, Margaret. Tillie was the "foreman" teaching other women and <u>men</u> how to weld. She was invited by the Navy Captain to go to Europe and help return the ships after the War. She could not go as she had two young girls to care for as they did offer child care to women like her at the time.

Tillie lost her brother, Luis Ruiz, from Arizona, shortly after the invasion of Normandy killed in a tank he was operating. Tillie later married another man, who was with Patton's famous third Armored Division and battled their way across the infamous Remagen Bridge in Germany. They liberated imprisoned Jews in the concentration camps they came across and saw the dead in railcars.

I write this to recall that the women on the West Coast of the U.S contributed to the war effort., like my family, who often overlooked.
