First, I had to look up the word brêlage. It is not a common word in English, but from the pictures I figured out that it means lashing, strapping or belt in English. I am not familiar with the paratrooper's equipment, but this looks like knife and ammo carrier?

Unfortunately, I have never heard of anyone labeling their equipment with a laundry number or with anything except their army serial number which is usually an 8-digit number. But, of course, I will include your request and photos in the next MailCall. Hopefully some of the soldiers can educate me and have some ideas about how to track this down.



Hello Loïc,

Sorry for the delay. Attached is the combined index for all the morning reports that we have. As you know, Mike Wells transcribed all the data from the morning reports, one at a time, into spreadsheets for each company. And now, he combined all those spreadsheets in to single file, which I have attached. If you know Excel, you can do a filter and that makes it easy to select individual units, dates, or people. Usually when looking for info about a specific soldier, I just turn on the filter and select by the last names.

Mike did his best to read and transcribe each MR, but there are some that even he had a little trouble deciphering the writing. He included all that data that he could make out, so this should help with any research. It does not include all the units, but it is all the ones that we found from Clark Archers old files after he died. There may be more units somewhere in the Army records. I don't know how Clark managed to make copies of all the MRs.

I did not include all the original scanned MRs, but both Mike and I do have scans for all that are in the spreadsheet, so I could send you any that you need. Most of those files are large and there are many. Up 200 MRs, about 1 to 4 MB each, some in jpg and some pdf formats. If you do want all the originals, let me know and I could zip them up and send them to you somehow. For now, just let me know whenever you want to look at some.

For the Thunderbolts, I do have some paper copies from Merle McMorrow, but have not had the time to make electronic copies. I did put the newer ones since 1999 on the page with the MailCall index: <a href="http://517prct.org/mailcall/index.htm">http://517prct.org/mailcall/index.htm</a> And there are a couple of the oldest ones from 1943 and 1944, plus a few pages of one from 1973, on the Historical Archives page: <a href="http://517prct.org/documents.htm">http://517prct.org/documents.htm</a>

I also have a small pile of paper Thunderbolts that I got from Merle McMorrow, maybe 10 issues or so probably from the 90's, but I have not had the time to scan these. That will take some time, page by page.

Last night I watched a program on bullying and wondered why we didn't do that. The more I thought about it, the more I realized our generation was not so innocent. This continued on into the early days of military training. The infantry troops remained at Camp Toccoa and the glider, artillery and engineer troops were sent to Camp Mackall. A street going down the middle of the camp separated the glider troops from the rest. The worst name you could call someone was "Glider Rider" Because of the boots, wings, and extra pay we felt superior. That all changed for me after my first glider ride in an experimental exercise. After that I would have gladly gone into combat 10 times by parachute to eliminate going into combat once by glider,

I know 75 years have passed, but if I made any disparaging remarks about glider troops, I am truly sorry.

wounded at the hand and one eye.

Gale SWARTHOUT was born in Bath, Steuben county, New York on the 15th of february 1925. He enlisted the US army for duration of the war on the 22 of april 1943 in Rochester N.Y. army serial number 32845505.

After infantry school he volonteer for paratroopers and joined the 517th parachute infantry Regiment. Attached to the Head-quarter company of the second battalion under command of Colonel Richard LSEITZ.

Sent in Europe spring 1944 his Regiment took part of the second D day. On the 15th of august 1944. He moved to Ombrone airfield near Grossetto. The company enplaned at 2.hoo and departed at 2h35. The first man who touch the ground in the company was the battalion commander Richard Seitz first to drop at 4h35. The HQ company landed between the villages of La Motte and Les Arcs. Exactly on their pre designated drop Zone. Alfa.

Following is the journal that private first Class Swarthout wrote from D day to D +8 then he was evacuated to Italy by hospital ship after being



"D day and following. ..

Got five letters on the 13th of august . We got our stuff ready for the jump which came on August the 15th 1944...

- "D" day : was'nt a bad day...
- D + one was the day we got the hell shot out of us. Lt. Robinson and Clark killed. Both from my plane.

Lemen walked across the road after machine gun and an 88mm hit him direct in the head. Gone from the chest up.

Went on outpost with Dobbs. We could hear Jerries talking and passing us all night. Could'nt shot any of them because they had us largely out numbered.

D + 3: Captain Clan sent me and a few other fellows into Le Muy on sniper duty.

I saw then thought i was going blind in the right eye. My right hand is starting to swell...

D + 4: We are with the 141st - 36th division and i had my fingers fixed and dramicel eye is getting worse.

- D + 5: taken prisoner. can't write today to circumstance behond my patrol. Only for a gun.
- D + 6: Jerry is getting nervous today and the way they talk they are going to move. I hope so.. Americans shelled them all night with 155mm ...10 jerries killed.
- T.S.: They have left now and we can get the wounded to a Hospital. Five with broken legs and three shot. At aid station i whowed them my hand and now i am goind back in a hospital ship.
- D + 8: Back to Italy in hospital. That is all...

PFC Gale Swarthout. HQ. Co. 2nd bn. 517th.

Swarthout was awarded from the bronze star for his action. He joined back his outfit late in december 44 during the battle of the Bulge.

He died in a car accident aged of 25, on the 26 of august 1950 in Fredericksburg. Virginia, while he was sleeping in the back seat and his friend was driving..
