

Jo Anne Spencer Clark, 97, of Colorado Springs, passed away on March 21, 2019. Born on July 6, 1921 in Columbus, Ohio to Paul R. Nicholson and Gladys (Stewart) Nicholson.

She graduated from Iowa State University 1943 with a Bachelor of Science degree. Jo Anne married Dick Spencer III in 1943. She lived in Des Moines, Iowa; Iowa City, Iowa and in Boulder, Colorado. She has been a Colorado Springs resident since 1951. She married Reverend Herbert W. Clark in 1985.

Jo Anne was interested in the arts, education, volunteering, water coloring, played cribbage at the senior center, and was very fond of her family and friends. She was a lifetime member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church; a President's Club member of University of Iowa; Iowa State University alumni. She is a charter member of PEO Chapters EA and FT and served as President of both. She was also

involved with the Pioneer Museum, Questers, Kinnikinnik DAR and Magna Carta Dames.

Jo Anne volunteered for 25 years with Pikes Peak Mental Health Association in the "Stepping Stones" program, she was voted "Volunteer of the Year" in 1995. Since 1981 Jo Anne served as a Foundation Board Member of Pikes Peak Community College, where in 1989 she established a continuing scholarship in honor of her 3 children.

Survived by her daughters, Barbara and Debbie, both of Colorado Springs; her granddaughter, Jade of Missoula, MT; her sister-in-law, Madge of Colorado Springs; and numerous nieces and nephews. Preceded in death by her son, Richard C. Spencer; her husbands, Dick Spencer III and Reverend Herbert Clark; her brothers, Paul and Jim Nicholson; and her sister, Phyllis Sherman.

Memorial service will be held Saturday, April 13, 2019 at 10:00 a.m. followed by a catered reception at Memorial Gardens Funeral Home and Cemetery, 3825 Airport Road in Colorado Springs.

Judi Crowe, Pvt. Gruwell's niece, has granted permission for a memorial plaque to be placed at the cemetery in Montaurou, France in honor of her uncle, **Pvt. Robert R. Gruwell.**

The Mayor of Montauroux, Jean Yves Huet and the sculptor, Claude Bernard are working to get the plaque made. It will most likely be unveiled in August, the 75th anniversary of Pvt. Gruwell's death and the anniversary of Operation Dragoon. I understand that members of the 517th PRCT and their families will be in Southern France in August. I hope that you and the French officials can coordinate things so that members of the 517th PRCT and their families can attend the unveiling. It would be a great honor to Pvt. Gruwell's memory if this can be coordinated. Pvt. Gruwell is the only member of the 517th that has never been accounted for. At least we know what cemetery he is buried in and perhaps in the future, he will be found.

I do believe that Mr. **Clark Archer**, the 517th Historian would be glad to attend if her could. As you know, Mr. Clark was the person who searched for Pvt. Gruwell in the 1990s and sent the documentation to the U.S. Army Heritage and Education Center in Carlisle, PA, where I found them and wrote Pvt. Gruwell's story.

William Martin "Bob" McGary



On March 17, 2019, three-days short of his 98th Birthday, Our Irish Father, Uncle, Grandfather, Great-Grandfather and Friend, celebrated this St. Patty's day by taking his final nap. He left us peacefully, as befits a man who showed quiet strength through all that this life had to throw at him.

Born in Clyde, Texas, March 20, 1921, to parents John William McGary and Maggie Laura Copeland, Bob was Big Brother to ten siblings. The depressionera meant hardships that the McGary's took in stride, with Bob quitting school in the 6th grade to help on the farm. Bob only missed the softball that he enjoyed playing as a child; many years later, he still had mad skills with a softball that he loved to how to his Grandchildren. In 1940 at the age of Nineteen, Bob joined the Army, serving six years in the infantry, assigned to the ETO (European

Theater of Operations). Attached to the 517th and then the 101st, Bob's boots carried him through much of the war in Europe; part of the occupying force in Sicily, then Naples and Rome. Then in 1943 while stationed near Rome Italy, he earned his Paratrooper wings. He was part of Operation Dragoon as the Allied forces invaded Southern France, and eventually earned his Purple Heart at the infamous Battle of the Bulge; pushing the Nazis back to the East through the snow-packed forests of Belgium. The recipient of a Bronze Star with a "V" device (denoting Valor in Combat), Bob was always humble about his deeds, choosing to focus on the human aspects; the people he knew, and the way the experiences shaped him. But oh how we love his stories of those days. In 1946, Bob "re-up-ed" for 3 more years, serving as a Mess Sergeant (Cook). Most of us know his bread, rolls, biscuits, and everything else he could make from a little flour and some water. Bob's handiness in the kitchen was ever-present as the family grew, and who can ever forget Bob's famous "Cayenne-Pepper shots"? Bob would insist to this day that his longevity was due to a little cayenne pepper in water every day. Bob's days in the military were only the first of many occupations Bob enjoyed; having spent entire careers in both the Railroad and the Oil-Rig industries. He somehow found time to also work Undercover with the D.E.A. in Arizona, which carried many more stories for us to enjoy. As Bob "slowed-down", most around these parts knew him as the "Snow-Cone Man", as he and Trinidad drove the streets of Carlsbad.

Bob's Marriage to Elizabeth brought his first child, Bill, who also waits for his Father on the other side. In 1960, Bob married the Love of his Life, Trinidad Torres McGary, who preceded him in death in 2017. This union merged two families into one, with Trinidad & Bob's children; Sophia (DeLeon), Bill, Edward, Patricia (Saldivar) and Ralph, then growing the family to include three more: Lillian (Miller), Cyndi, and DeaEsta (Solomon). The McGary clan has grown from there to include twenty Grandchildren, many Great grandchildren, and even more who call themselves part of the family.

Bob was always a religious man, with stories of times when divine providence saved his life during WWII. In the '70s, The Bob & Trini McGary family joined themselves to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, where for the rest of their days they remained as active as their health would allow. Though Bob would never be accused of being a saint, he loved God, and he showed it in the way he treated others with honesty, kindness and generosity, even when he didn't much care for them.

Bob's legacy is strength and perseverance. He believed, and taught us all, that "you can do anything, if you hold your kisser right".

I am disappointed to report that the ceremony at the Rhone, usually on the morning of the 16th, has not occurred for the last couple of years. If you attended 70th anniversary observances, you remember what I do: the many volunteer groups and re-enactors, together with cemetery and sometimes US government officials in a heartfelt ceremony of thanks and friendship. Sadly, this seems not to be specific to the Rhone but rather has evidently occurred all over, with volunteer/living history organizations being scaled way back or eliminated totally from ceremonies at ABMC sites. The ceremony that replaces it is attended by many dignitaries and often members of the US 6th Fleet; it is large, later and far more official in nature.

I will write to our favorite associate there and ask if we can use the side garden for a gathering of friends (which we did five years ago), at some other time if people think it's a good idea.

The "official" ceremony at the Rhone will almost certainly conflict directly with a friend's ceremony (likely at Valbourges). For me personally, I am saddened that friends who inaugurated these events are being pushed aside. Last year, we attended the same ceremony - but it was held at Valbourges instead. I prefer the Rhone to the chateau, to be sure - but I don't know what other venue could support this event.

We have attended the "official" ceremonies at the Rhone, probably three times in recent years, and I cannot recommend it for my father. It's long, hot and tiring.

There are many other times to visit the Rhone, and we do. We can go and help take the flags down at 4:30 (as Dad and Leo did one year), and we often make a quick visit simply to pay respects. I would say we probably go over three times on an average trip. My point is that there are many times to pay respects or visit to place flowers if you'd like (they now have vases and water taps, so we can bring our own flowers for graves. I think that this might be something we'd like to do for the 75th for the men of the 517th, and it wouldn't be too costly if we get market flowers).

I would love to visit Sospel, where the 517 was also instrumental. Patou and Roland would like to know how many people would like to visit there after the 14/16 August events.

So this is what I have thus far. Bruce Broudy - please add Eileen's email (how can I not have it?).

In the past, we have mentioned a couple of famous people who trained as paratroopers at Toccoa and MacKall, including Rod Serling of *The Twilight Zone* and actor Harold Russell. I wasn't familiar with Harold Russell at all, but recently did some research and was surprised by what I found. Some strange coincidences with my Dad, Ben Barrett.

Harold John Russell was born in Canada and moved to Massachusetts after his father's death. (My Mother, Fran (Lawlor) Barrett, was a Canadian who also came to Massachusetts after her parent's death and finished high school.)

Harold Russell worked in a food market in Cambridge, MA before the war. (Ben Barrett owned a small laundry in Cambridge for most of his working years.)

Harold Russell was an Army demolition instructor at Camp MacKall with the 515th PIR. (Ben Barrett was also at jump

school with the 515th at Camp MacKall around the same time before he transferred to the 517th.).

Russell was training paratroopers at Camp MacKall NC on June 6, 1944 when some TNT he was using exploded in his hands. He lost both hands.

After receiving hooks, and training on them, he was chosen to make an Army training film called "Diary of A Sergeant". William Wyler saw the film and decided to cast him in The Best Years of Our Lives (1946). Harold Russell played Homer Parish. For this role he received 2 Oscars, a Best Supporting and one for being an inspiration to all returning veterans. He is the only actor to receive 2 Oscars for the same role.

After the movies, Russell enrolled at Boston University's College of Business Administration, from which he graduated in 1949. (Ben Barrett also graduated from BU's College of Business Administration, also in 1949.)

Mr. Russell became so adept with the hooks that replaced his hands, that he would often joke that he could do anything but pick up a dinner check with them.

He later went on to help establish AMVETS as a viable alternative to the American Legion for veterans, though his dream of an international veteran's organization was never realized. The top annual award of the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities is called The Harold Russell Medal.

He later appeared in *Inside Moves* (1980) and *Dogtown* (1997). He lived with his wife on Cape Cod in Massachusetts. He wrote 2 biographies: "*Victory in My Hands*" (1947) & *"The Best Years of My Life"* (1981).

He is buried in Wayland, MA.
