Thank you for your response.

I attended the Savanah, Portland and Washington DC reunions with my parents.

I remember my dad telling me how terrible the Tennessee maneuvers were. Years later, at the (I think Savanah) a reunion **Dick Seitz** stated that of his entire WWII experience, the Tennessee maneuvers was the most miserable. It was incredible to hear that confirmation of what my dad had told me many times.

My dad also told me of the time they saw an engineering team trying to take down a shell the Germans hung on lines in fields to kill gilder crews. The shell exploded. He recalled that their medic, Koscio (spell?), a man who supposedly carried many knives on him) asked for permission to help. He was granted person and was told to hurry back and stay with his guys. My dad said he could never get anyone who recalled that incident. But at Savanah I recall someone recalled it exactly as my dad recalled.

Airborne all the way, Airborne every day!

K. Allan Johnson was part of Goodman's group. He participated in this ambush by returning to La Motte: "There was a Scottish Battalion, the British had dropped there also. The next day we take off and I'm with a group of about... 8 maybe, and there's two guys and one of them is a Scotsman. My sergeants, both of whom had hurt their legs could not walk so we were towing them, taking turns on a machine gun cart. It's a little cart, I don't know what a machine gun cart was doing there, but we were towing them. We stopped to have lunch and now we were well behind the main column. They already passed way.


We are going to have something to eat. We have these K rations and we're sitting there. There was a road that came on an angle and some French residents, farmers and such came running up the road yelling "Germany, Germany, Germany." They were going to be coming down that road, so we ran up the hill. I don't know if it was 100 yards or 300 yards because that whole area which was all rock bed is now cork trees.



So we ran up the hill, and as they came around somebody, somehow or other threw a grenade at the first truck. He might've been the one I saw who was burned all over and dead. It was an American, but I don't know who. That slowed the convoy down a little. We fired at the convoy from up in the hills, not much, whenever we saw something. I remember I had a German dead center, I was going to hit him, I fired, he did not drop. Now, what the hell is wrong? I discovered only later that I had not run up the sites on my Ml. It must have hit some rock in front of him.


I spent the 20 minutes to a half-hour, firing a few shots at the truck or one of the trucks. They had to come around, and they slowed down by the truck that was stopped. So when they had all gone, I came walking down. They had dropped and thrown away a lot of stuff on the side of the road, including a very young person. I don't remember now whether he was a German or a young Frenchman, but he was drunk and throwing up and had been hit by somebody. And I missed by three seconds or so, a Long Barrel Luger that was lying around, somebody else got to it first.

We were there looking things over, when, within a few minutes, a jeep arrives with a British officer in it and a stretcher. They put this young fellow, (I think it was a German soldier but he looked like a kid), they put him on the stretcher and I got to sit in back and got back to where we are supposed to be."

Twins in the 460th PFAB

Two parachutists from the 460th PFAB A Battery, Roger and Richard Tallakson, are absolutely identical twins. They had asked to jump from a different plane because their father and mother did not want to receive two bad news in a single telegram from the War Department in Wachington DC. When the green light went on in their respective C-47s, they jumped in darkness. Roger lands about 40 km from his designated drop zone and Richard 48 km away. In the light of day, each of the twins begin to ask questions of other men to get information about their missing brother. Richard hears that Roger was killed, Roger also hears that his brother Richard is dead. Two days after the jump, Roger staggers into the staging area as he spots Richard sitting next to a freshly dug foxhole reading a letter from the house. Neither of them had been hurt.
