

Unfortunately, I do not have much about **Daniel R Sada** in my (incomplete) records of the 517th. I do see him listed on the 517th Christmas 1944 roster with A Battery of the 460th Parachute Field Artillery Battalion. http://517prct.org/documents/xmas1944/xmas1944.htm

And the brief note in Mailcall 828 from January 2004 mentioning that Dan had died. http://517prct.org/mailcall/828.htm

I see that Dan Sada did include a short bio in the 517 book from Turner Publishing (1998) which I have attached.

If you know his daughter, let us know if she has any ww2 photos or stories.

DANIEL R. SADA, born July 21, 1924. Volunteered for military service May 13, 1943. Accepted for paratroops at Camp Toccoa, GA and assigned to Btry. A, 460th Prcht. Field Arty. Bn. Basic training at Camp Mackall, NC and completed four weeks jump training at Ft. Benning, GA in July 1943. The 517th PRCT was formed after the Tennessee maneuvers. Removed from the division and sent to Italy in May 1944. Pfc. Sada participated in five battle campaigns in Europe and parachuted into southern France on Aug. 15, 1944.



After the jump immediately started to assemble the artillery gun. Crew assisted in placing, firing, displacing and withdrawing pieces in combat operations. Manipulated gun traverse wheels to change elevation and deflection to place gun on target. Opened and closed breech and loaded gun by hand. Fired piece by pulling hand lanyard. When he was in the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium he was in fox hole surrounded with snow. Suddenly he heard voices from the German officer telling Sada's American officer to "let the guns down and surrender, you don't have a chance." Sada's American officer replied to the German "nuts to you." Then they started moving through Berlin Germany. The 517th PRCT were the first ones to occupy the occupation in Berlin Germany. He stayed some months in the occupation in Berlin Germany.

His decorations and citations include the Good

Conduct Medal, American Theater Campaign Medal w/ 5 Bronze Stars and 1 Bronze Arrowhead, Distinguished Unit Badge, and WWII Victory Medal. He was honorably discharged on Jan. 6, 1946.

In July 1948 he attended California Flying School to get aircraft master mechanic license. He started working with Flying Tigers Line from 1950-80. Leticia, his first wife, and he have four children (two boys and two girls). Unfortunately his wife passed away in October 1987. He and his second wife, Maria Isabel, were married in 1989 and they have one girl. They are all happy together. May God bless you all. Airborne all the way. Sada has been retired since 1980.




The <u>Dragoon 1944 Virtual Museum</u> which provided the August 14 image of parachutes in Southern France on Page 1 also has these photos of an Airborne cap badge and oval wings with 517th colors. These look very much homemade and original. They came from a collection of Roger P Berringer, also including his Infantry School Parachute Jump Qualification from May 1942. Unfortunately, I cannot find any record of Derringer in my own 517th records, which is unusual. I do see his NARA enlistment record from Jan 9, 1942. He enlisted in Ohio.



... Nevermind. I did find photos of T/4 Roger "Bud" Derringer in Michel De Trey's book, First Airborne Task Force. Derringer was with the 509th. The 509th oval is almost the same colors was the 517th, but the outside border is a gray color and the 517th is more of a silver color. See below.

Second, I don't have much info on John Subra yet. I do see him on the December 1944 roster with A Company.

There is one guestbook entry in 2007 from **Jeffrey Subra**, who must be your brother. He hinted at having some WWII letters from your father. I'd love to see them or any other stories or photos from your dad.

One other thing: it looks like you just signed up for MailCalls. Good thing I got your email, as it appears that you had a typo in your gmail address. So I fixed it. Welcome to the 517th family. But don't set your MailCall expectations too high. It's just news and stories and a little history from the group. I don't actually write much. I just pass on what I hear from others and answer questions if I can find answers.

Tell me what you know about your father's service years if you have more info.

Hello Bob,

Thank you for your quick response and welcoming me to the 517th Family. It's wonderful to make contact with you.

You are correct. I'm John R Subra's daughter and no relation to Lt. Gary Davis of F Comp. Also, my brother is Jeffrey Subra who contacted you in the past. I have copied him.

We do have his letters that he wrote during WWII and some WWII photos. I will be happy to share those. Also, we have an Acceptance Letter written by **Col L.A. Walsh, Jr**, sent to John's mother Bessie Subra on 19 Aug 43 notifying her of John being selected to the 517th.



John registered on 30 Dec 1942 while in his Senior Year of High School. His induction date was 30 Mar 1943, Fort Snelling, Minnesota. He received his Central High School Diploma, St. Paul, Minnesota, after the War on 28 Jan 1948. Honorable discharge. Date of Separation 26 Nov 1945.

John fought in Rome-Arno, Southern France, Ardennes, Rhineland, European Theater Operation. Records & Citations: American Theater Ribbon, European-African-Middle, Eastern Theater Ribbon, Wounded in the European Theater Operation. Purple Heart GO 6 HQ 106 and Bronze Star Medal. He was also in Africa.

I'm not quite sure where to start with pictures. Please note gmail will only send 3-4 pictures at a time but I will happily send more. Unfortunately, I do not have a copy of the email that I sent you the other day. So if there is a duplicate, I apologize.



The first photo below is of **Cpl Albert A. Delgado** and my Father. Albert was a very good friend of my Father. Albert's death on 16 Jan 1945 in Belgium was very hard on my Father.

My father was WIA at Trois-Ponts, Belgium on 4 Jan 1945. He was hit in the leg with a M88 and blown into the next room. Every now and then throughout his life, shrapnel would emerge from his skin. His leg pained him the rest of his life and he walked with a slight limp.

My Father was not at Albert's side when he was KIA and this affected him. However. typical of the WWII vets back in the 50's and 60's, he did not really talk about his war experiences. The War was very hard on my Father's health. My Father passed on 1 Oct 1968 and is buried at Fort Snelling in Minnesota. He married my mother in 1946 and they raised 5 children together.

In his letters that he sent home during the War, there are some where he specifically addresses the War directly. I will locate these for you.

My Brother Jeff gave me the website <u>http://www.517prct.org/mailcall/2216</u> where Albert's niece, Melissa Delgado Stutenroth, has two postings. My Brother did locate email addresses for her so I'm planning on making contact with her. I'm sure she would like the photo attached below and another photo of Albert, my Father, with two friends in France. I believe that was the location it was taken.





The next picture is of my Father's grave marker in Fort Snelling, MN. The Gravemarker has recorded BSM-PH. I noticed on the 517th Org website that my father is not listed as receiving a Bronze Star. I do recall seeing this medal. I believe my Brother has it. Do you know how his name could be added?



The 3rd picture is of my father in 1944. This photo and one other is what used to compare to the Mail Call photo that I believe is of my father. However, even before comparing the pics, I recognized my Father.

Also the A Company at Toccoa pic by **Jack Smothers**, My father is number 58 (4th picture attached). Unfortunately, his name is not recorded on the picture and I'm not sure who to contact to have him recorded. Could you help me with this?

Also, thank you for sending me a copy of the Dec 1944 A Company Roster. It's very nice to have.

I'm looking forward to your response. Also, please let me know that the 4 photos attached did reach you.

In the meantime, I will pick out photos and letters that I believe will interest you. I have a number of pics already in mind to send to you.

Wow. Great info. I'll have to digest all that and send you a long email back.

First, I forgot to ask. Your original note said that you thought it was your father in one of the mailcall photos. But which photo? Which MailCall?

The letter from Col. Walsh means that he joined in Camp Toccoa, GA with the original unit of the 517th. Looks like he stayed into 1945. He was wounded by the M88, but somehow stayed with the unit? Probably not, as you say he was not there when Delgado was killed.

BTW, my dad was wounded by an M88 just outside of Trois Ponts also on Jan 4th. I've never quite figured that out, since he was with F Company, and most of the Jan 4-5 battles there were **Bill Boyle**'s first battalion.

Hello Bob,

Good to hear from you. Thank you for asking for clarification. I will do my best to clarify.

The Mail Call pic you asked about is the: "Mail Call 517th Company A." From Home Page under 'Contents' click on "517th Mail Call" and the pic is right there, right under "Subscribe to our Mailing List."

I have attached below the full pic (1st attached below) entitled: "Mail Call pictured John R Subra 517th Company A". In addition, in pic 2 attached below, I have drawn a red arrow to my Father in the "Mail Call 517th Comp A - John R Subra depicted".

My Father was in Company A and I understand (from my sister) that Company A was the only Unit that stayed together from Training Camp Toccoa until the end of the war. Delgado was also in Company A and at Camp Toccoa.

Your email stated: "BTW, my dad was wounded by an M88 just outside of Trois Ponts also on Jan 4th. I've never quite figured that out, since he was with H Company, and most of the Jan 4-5 battles there were Bill Boyle's first battalion."

There must have been some confusion with Lt. Gary Davis of F Company. I have <u>no</u> relation to Lt. Davis. Or maybe I'm not understanding what you are referring to.

My Father was wounded on 4 Jan 1945 in Tois Pont. He then was sent to a 1st Aid Station, possibly in Manhay, then he was sent back to England until he recovered. Since he did not have enough points at that time to go home, he was then sent to Germany as part of the "Occupation Force rejoining his unit the 517th which then at that time became part of the 82nd Airborne. This info is from my brother Jeff.

I will get other photo's and letters together this week. However, I have included below an additional pic. Left to right: Unknown, John Subra, Albert Delgado, unknown (my mother said was taken in France). Maybe you might recognize the two unknown friends in the pic 3 below that is entilted "unk, Subra, Delgado, unk 1944 France".

Hi Jeanne,


No confusion with you and the other Jeanie Davis. I have that clear now.

Note: I had a typo in my email to you, as my Dad was in H Company and wounded in Trois Ponts. Bill Boyle's 1st Battalion, including John Subra's A Company was also in heavy fighting in Trois Ponts in early January 1945.

Sorry to disappoint you but that Mail Call photo (below) which you think you might see John Subra is not the 517th. It is a standard picture from some Army site that I borrowed, and I don't know the unit. It also looks too clean and organized for the 517th during the war, although it also look like it was probably at a state-side training facility, not in a combat zone.

I have visited Manhay and Trois Ponts with my Dad. But after he was wounded (technically in Bergeval) with many of his comrade, he was evacuated and sent to a hospital in England for 6 months. He never returned to the 517th during the war.

We know that PFC Anthony J. Kovac was with the 517th in December 1944, as he is listed on the Christmas 1944 roster: http://517prct.org/documents/xmas1944/xmas1944.htm

I also have copies of several morning reports which show him as MIA on August 19, 1944 and returned after being listed as LWA (Lightly Wounded in Action), assigned to the 7th Army (hospital?), and returned to duty on November 11.

It looks like another battle casualty on Jan 5 1945 near Bergeval Belgium. (attached)

Hope this helps a little. I will keep looking. And I am posting your request in the MailCall newsletter.



Arriving at the train station, his battalion is facing an enemy force estimated to one battalion. He will resist valiantly all day before being relayed by **Lt. Col. Dick Seitz'** 2/517th PIR

At the end of the afternoon of August 16, the 3/517 arrived from the area of Fayence will launch a counter-attack which will put an end to the resistance south of Les Arcs.
