**Lee S. Hulett** 1st Bn 517 PIR Vet in Moscow with a Russian Paratrooper Vet, May 1995 during the 50 Year Anniversary Celebration of V-E Day. The year before, June 1994, Lee jumped in Normandy during the D-Day 50th Anniversary Festivities with a group of WWII Paratroopers including Pacific vets and



some like Lee who didn't participate in D-Day but had jumped elsewhere (Southern France and Holland).

I had the privilege of meeting and jumping with some of these troopers at Bennett Field DZ in Salisbury, Md during their training jumps with ram air skydiving chutes.

Lee was my insurance agent and skydiving instructor and jump master but most importantly he was my friend, We made about 25-30 jumps together, including a few demo jumps at VA homes and Veteran Events.

Unfortunately, Lee died on October1, 1995 in a skydiving accident at a Pennsylvania DZ less than 5 months after this photo with the Russki.

He lived life to the fullest, knowing and accepting that none of us get out alive. Rest In Eternal Peace Brother in that big DZ in the Sky .AATW

**Comments:** My father served proudly with the 517th and was very active with reunions and the local (Maryland) DAV. I just found this website and thought I would inform visitors that knew him of his death on 1-OCT-95. In 1982 he and I became active sport skydivers together. From that point he went on to make over 1400 and eventually taught skydiving in MD, VA and PA. Maybe some of you jumped with him for the return to Normandy 50th reunion. He died at age 70 on his 4th jump of the day. He always told me and my siblings that if he had an accident, we could count on 2 things: he would have all handles pulled and he would have a smile on his face. He was buried at Arlington National and was honored by a dozen or so of his 517th brothers who traveled from all over the USA. They don't make 'em like that any more! Lloyd S Hulett

Thanks for getting back to me. I passed on the info to my father. He said that he knew that about your father having spoken to him at one of the reunions. You are right it is not surprising but sad non the less that most of the men are gone. Thanks for all you do and connecting my dad with Loïc.
