

This one is from Trenton, New Jersey, the archives of the Trenton-Times Advertiser,

August 13, 1942.

Gordon Joseph Lippman was a Vietnam War Era casualty on December 11, 1965. ★ He served with honor in the United States Army. ★ He is remembered by the people of South Dakota ★ May his positive example inspire us, as global citizens. ★ When we work together, we can help one another.

ORIGINS

Gordon Joseph Lippman was born on November 25, 1924. According to our records South Dakota was his home or enlistment state and Perkins County included within the archival record. We have Lemmon listed as the city.



SERVICE

He had enlisted in the United States Army. Entered the service via Regular Military. Served during the Vietnam War. He began his tour on September 16, 1965. Lippman had the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. His military occupation or specialty was Infantry Unit Commander. Service number assignment was 60536. Attached to HHC, 3rd Brigade, 1st Infantry Division.

CASUALTY

During his service in the Vietnam War, Army Lieutenant Colonel Lippman experienced a traumatic event which ultimately resulted in loss of life on <u>December 11, 1965</u>. Recorded circumstances attributed to: Hostile, died of wounds, Gun or small arms fire. Incident location: South Vietnam.

DETAILS

Lt. Col. Gordon Lippman enlisted in the Army on 19 March 1943 at Los Angeles, California. He served with the 517th Parachute Regiment in the ETO. His unit served in Italy, Southern France, the Ardennes-Alsace, and in Germany.

He was wounded in December 1944 during the Battle of the Bulge. He received his battlefield commission shortly thereafter, from sergeant to 1st Lt..

He served in Korea during the Korean War, and was wounded a second time. He received the DSC during this time for his actions at the crossing of the Hant' an River, Korea.

On 16 September 1965, he was assigned to duty in Viet Nam where he served as the executive officer of the 3rd Brigade, 1st Infantry Division at Lai Khe, RVN.

During the night of 11 December 1965, several Viet Cong snipers infiltrated the perimeter of his



camp. Lt. Col Lippman tried to personally locate the snipers, and while moving across an open area when he was shot and killed.

REMEMBERED

Gordon Joseph Lippman is buried or memorialized at Arlington National Cemetery. This is a National American Cemetery administered through the Department of the Army.

Gordon is honored on the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial in Washington DC. Name inscribed at VVM Wall, Panel 4e, Line 12.

Lt. Gordon J. Lippman was with HQ/1. WE have a bio of him on the website at Gordon Lippman

Gordon enlisted in the Army in March of 1943 and after basic training was sent to the European Theatre with the "517th Parachute Regiment Combat Team". In WWII, Gordon was wounded in December 1944 in the Battle of the Bulge, for which he was awarded a battlefield commission of 1st Lieutenant. His commission was based on these incidents: "On 21 December 1944, the 1st BN, was attached to the 3rd Armored Division and committed against the German break through Belgium near Soy. The BN was ordered to attack at once and clear the road from Soy to Hotten and also to clear Hotten, half of which was held by MP's and cooks from the 3rd Armored Division and the other half by the enemy. The first attempt to clear the road to Hotten failed. The Battalion Commander then decided that Co. B of the 1st BN would continue the attack to Hotten and he, the BN Commander, would take Co A mounted on tanks and halftracks and try to get into Hotten from a rear route. The machine gun platoon was attached to Co. A for this action and as the platoon leader was absent, Sgt. Lippman commanded the platoon. Co. A managed to get into Hotten and attack toward Soy. Sgt. Lippman and six machine guns were with the attacking platoon. They cleared part of the town. Sgt. Lippman then set his machine guns in the captured buildings and held for the rest of the night."





Joseph L Clark, HQ Company, 1st Battalion



Joseph Lambert Clark, 95, passed away at his home in Tucson, Arizona on January 5, 2021. He was born in Mammoth, Arizona to Richard J. and Etirza Verdugo Clark, Sr. Joe was a descendant of the Clark, Barragan and Verdugo Southern Arizona Pioneer families and was raised on a cattle ranch in the San Pedro River Valley. He graduated from Tucson High in 1943 a semester early in order to enlist in the Army to fight in WWII. While in the Army, he became an All-American paratrooper in the 517th Parachute Infantry Regiment, later consolidating to the 13th Airborne Division in Europe.

Once WWII ended, Joe returned home to the family ranch where he married Doris Quarles, a Baltimore city girl he met while stationed at Fort Meade, Maryland. Joe attended the University of Arizona for two years before going to work in the mining industry. Joe started as a pipe fitter and worked his way to Superintendent. He was consulted for his mining expertise by colleagues around the world. He also taught

technical classes at Central Arizona College. Our father was a devoted family man and was known to help those in need. He was an avid reader and could fix anything put before him, whether mechanical or a broken heart. He did not travel much since his home was his sanctuary. However, he and Doris did travel in retirement to visit family in New Zealand, Norway and Denmark.

Joe is preceded in death by his wife of 72 years, Doris; son John and grandson, Roy Pool; his parents, brothers, Richard Jr. (Nellie), Charlie (Phil) and sisters, Clara, Lilla Burney (Bob) and Cora Hall (Buck). Joe is survived by his children, Norman, Carol, Mark, Nancy Konsmo (Oystein) and daughter-in-law, Phyllis. Also, survived by his grandchildren, Etirza Nuest (David), Linzie Klein (Travis), Zachary Clark (Jocelyn), Ryan Pool, Chelsea Clark and Kristine Konsmo; great-grandchildren, Logan, Aidan, Myranda, Julieann, Brendon, Lily and Madelyn. Joseph has been interred together with Doris at the Veteran's Memorial Cemetery in Marana, Arizona. There will be a funeral mass and celebration of life at a later date. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital or the Arizona Historical Society.

I only knew Joe from 517th reunions, but I know he served beside my father in one of the greatest Airborne units of all time. He was a great man, and part of the greatest generation.
